above an exemption and reach 75 per cent of that part of an inheritance over \$10,000,000.

Incomes to Bear Brunt
The individual income tax play would raise from 53 to 54 per cent the present surtax on individual exemptions. The maximum rate on incomes over \$10,000,000 would go 75 per cent against the present 59.

Official Statement Issued
After the democrats had met for more than two hours, Doughton issued a statement saying:

"We have tentatively agreed to have a surtax rate provision starting at 150,000 with graduated rates up to 75 per cent on net incomes over \$10,000,000.

"We expect to have a graduated corporation income tax under very narrow limits of graduation.

"We expect to impose a moderate excess-profits tax.

"We expect to have an inheritance tax graduated up to 75 per cent on inheritances over \$10,000,000, with \$50,000 exemption.

"We expect to have a gift tax at about three-fourths the rate of the inheritance tax."

Here are some figures to indicate how much of an inheritance would be taken by the government under the tentative schedule—\$60,000, tax \$400; \$100,000, tax \$500; \$500,000, tax \$110,000; \$1,000,000, tax \$300,000; \$2,000,000, tax \$700,000; \$5,000,000, tax \$2,440,000; \$10,000,000, tax \$5,80,000.

Gifts would be taxed about three-fourth of that amount and would be subjected to the new levies for two reasons: To prevent evasion of inheritance taxes, and to bring in revenue promptly instead of only years after an individual had died and left a fortune.

KLAMATH FALLS, July 25.—(AP)—Deluging Klamath Falls in a sheet of water, the season's most severe storm broke here this morning. Accompanied by vivid streaks of lightning, more than half an inch of rain fell between dawn and 8:00 o'clock. It was still raining and records for years appeared about to collapse.

The season's moisture at 8:00 o'clock was 12.78 inches, representing the wettest year since 1926.

Klamath's rainiest July was in 1916 when there was a fall of 1.57 inches of moisture. With 1.52 inches already recorded for this month, it was expected the mark would be discarded before then. No reports of forest fires from lightning had been received by the forest protective association early today. Trains from

the south were late but railroad officials attributed this to heavy traffic rather than the storm.
