"FLYING FORTRESS" AWAITS AIR BAPTISM!



Poised for a series of experimental flights, and then its supreme test, a hop from Seattle, Wash., to Dayton, O., the huge mystery Boeing bomber, said to be the largest land plane ever built, a veritable sky fortress, is pictured here in front and side views before making its air debut at Boeing Field in Seattle. With a wing spread of 105 feet, and streamlined over its 70-foot length, the mammoth, 15-ton low-wing monoplane has four 725 h. p. motors which can hurl it over a 2500-mile non-stop range at a speed of from 200 to 250 miles an hour. From its aluminum body, like warts on a dinosaur, jut four machine gun turrets, shielded by unbreakable glass. Note two of these turrets, at the side and top, in the scene below. The monster air cruiser is protected by the latest safety devices—"robot" pilot, two-way radio telephones and a radio "homing" device. The Boeing, built by the company whose passenger craft now are used for speedy service on transcontinental lines, will compete at Dayton against other ships being considered for army purchase.

PLANNERS DEMAND HOLT KEEP POST

would be to retain Holt. He explained that it was probable that a permanent secretary for the commission might be employed with WPA funds. This, he said, would relieve the chairman of much clerical and detail work.
When informed of the statements made by Cully and Maxey, Holt said that he had in no way changed his plans for resignation, and was certain the committee could find a suitable successor.
Cully and Maxey were both of the opinion that some action, either to retain Holt or select another man for the position, would be taken immediately. Until such action is taken, Holt will remain as acting chairman of the commission.
J. J. Karstetter, district engineer for the WPA, was at the meeting on Wednesday night, and intimated that an engineer would soon be stationed in Lane county to aid in the drawings and organization of the projects submitted. This possibility, stated Maxey, would further lighten the burden placed on the commission's chairman.
In Wednesday night's meeting the commission endorsed a series of projects presented by groups throughout the county. They included flood control work in West Springfield and on the south fork of the Willamette, the Eugene eastside grade crossing elimination, reclamation in the Long Tom and Muddy creek districts, and the Pacific highway sidewalk construction. These projects will now be sent

to the state planning commission for final approval.
The sidewalk project, which proposes to construct a 3 mile long four-foot walk through West Springfield, beginning just east of Eugene, and ending at the overhead crossing near the McKenzie highway junction, was the subject of much favorable comment by the committee.
Plans for the Long Tom drainage work were reported developing rapidly, and a committee was appointed to make plans for an early meeting of all residents of the district. This committee consists of O. S. Fletcher, P. M. Morse, and Angus Gibson. Fletcher said Thursday that definite plans for the conclave would be announced as soon as arrangements could be completed for securing Professor W. L. Powers of Oregon State college as a consultant in the organization of the reclamation work.

Veterans Memorial Before Commanders

The plan to create a World war veterans memorial in conjunction with the proposed pioneer museum has been referred to the local Commanders' council and that group is expected to take the matter up at its August meeting. The Commanders' council hopes, too, to bring about a permanent organization for the Skinner Butte Memorial park, established in honor of the World War dead last fall, as well as for general memorial plans. This group would be made up of representatives from various veterans organizations and from city groups. The council does not have another meeting until the third week of August.

LONDON WOOL

LONDON, July 25.—(AP)—In addition to the 4,957 bales of wool offered for sale at the closing session of the fourth auction series today, 2,707 bales of South American wools were placed on the market, and of these offered 5,905 were sold. All lines sold well during the series despite firm limits, and the selection of wool was excellent. The home trade were the principal operators, and, although opening prices were not maintained, the series closed with a firm tone owing to the broadening demand. Merinos and crossbreds closed 10 to 15 per cent higher than closing prices of the last series, while alipes were par to 5 per cent dearer. During this series the home trade bought 59,000 bales, the continent 40,500, and about 72,000 were sold over.

COUNTIES CLAMOR FOR ROAD FUNDS IN NEW PROGRAM

abandoned. Assistance in the construction of roads with grant money to permit more efficient results will be sought from the counties, Cabell stated.
R. H. Babcock, highway engineer, announced it would be late tonight or tomorrow before a tentative allocation could be completed. Recently the commission allocated about \$1,200,000 of the regular federal aid which is now up for approval by the bureau of public roads.
Umpqua Road to Fore
Two Douglas county delegations, the county court and Reedsport citizens requested funds for three projects—straightening Turkey hill on the Pacific highway, three grade crossings south of Sutherlin and near Roseburg, and the improvement of the Reedsport-Scottsburg section of the Umpqua highway. The commission declined to make any commitments.
Grade crossing elimination in the city of Klamath Falls was urged by another delegation. The Willamette county delegation urged the completion of the Enterprise-Clatskanie highway; Astoria urged the improvement of city streets, as did the representatives from Ashland. Completion of the South Santiam was asked by Lincoln county.
A large delegation from Clatsop and Tillamook counties reminded the commission of a four-year agreement for construction of the Cannon Beach-Neahkahanie mountain short cut on the coast highway, while Multnomah groups again requested money for the Wolf creek road to the sea. Coos county delegations asked for several improvements on near Marshfield, and the suggestion of accepting the 120 acres timber land at Golden Falls for a state park in return for a logging road.

ATTENDS CONVENTION

Postmaster Frank L. Armitage left Wednesday for Coquille where he will attend the state convention of postmasters. He is one of 63 postmasters in Lane county, most of whom planned to attend the Coquille meet. The purpose of the convention will be to co-ordinate the work of the postal chiefs of the state, discuss postal regulations, and exchange plans for more efficient service.

making mush. When it is well cooked, remove from fire, add sugar and flavoring to taste. This is good while hot and equally so when cold eaten with cream or top milk as a pudding.
Clabbered milk may be used instead of buttermilk if some cream is added and heat well with the egg beater and add the flour as soon as you put it on the stove.—Goldie M. Josephsen, R. 3, Eugene.
Cottage Cheese Sandwiches
To one pound of cottage cheese allow 12 stuffed olives and 3 small sweet pickles. Mince the olives and pickles very fine and mix with the cottage cheese, season to taste and spread on thin slices of buttered bread.—Mrs. Allen Hart, 1620 Moss St., Eugene.
Buttermilk Nut Biscuits
2 cups pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
3-4 cup buttermilk
1 cup walnut meats cut in small pieces
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
4 tablespoons shortening.
Sift together salt, soda, flour and sugar. Work in shortening, add buttermilk gradually, mixing to a stiff dough. Place on floured board, knead until smooth. Roll to one inch in thickness. Sprinkle chopped walnuts over top and roll to 1/4 inch in thickness. Cut biscuits with small fancy cutter, brush tops with shortening and bake in oven heated to (450 deg. F.) for thirteen minutes.—Aethia L. Carr, 1659 23rd Ave. E., Eugene.

Brother Believes Dr. Smertenko Alive
