Bulletins Out On 4-H Health Event

Bulletins are going out this week to all 4-H health club members from the office of R. C. Kuehner, county 4-H club agent, regarding the health club round-up to be held at the community and 4-H fair in Cottage Grove, August 17. This fair will offer the first opportunity since last year at the county fair to have a complete physical examination under the supervision of the county health unit at no expense to the club members or parents.

Only health club members from the southern part of Lane county are going to take part in this round-up at Cottage Grove. The boys and girls having the highest score on the examination will be selected, the winners to be awarded a half-scholarship to the 1936 4-H club summer school at Corvallis. In addition to the championships, ribbons will be awarded to five places for the class for boys and the class for girls and each member taking the examination will be awarded an exhibitor's ribbon. The examinations will be given under the supervision of the Lane County Health unit and will commence at 9 a. m., Saturday, August 17, in the Cottage Grove armory.

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Court Holds Over Mooney Decision

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—(AP)—The California supreme court today continued to Monday a decision on an application of Tom Mooney for ad-

pointment of a commissioner to take depositions in his habeas corpus for freedom.
