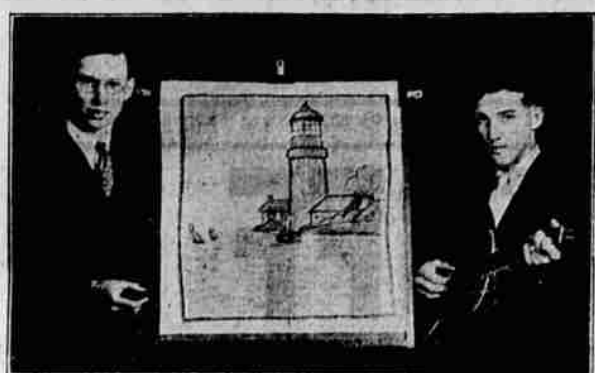

"CIGAR BOX" TALE PROVIDES MYSTERY IN LOBBY INQUIRY

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blue suit, stiff collar, white shirt and black bow tie.

In testimony yesterday, Carpenter and Joe A. Worsham, counsel of the Texas firm, said the "box" might have been a box of cigars or a bundle of books on livestock raising.

Old Pal O' Mine Swinging his arms and turning frequently to face spectators who crowded the room, Patton testified he was an old friend of Carpenter. Patton said the box he brought to the committee was the one given him by Carpenter several days before the vote.

"There were 50 of them, and I'd like to have never gotten rid of them."

He said he took the books to Carpenter's hotel to give them to the utility executive's son. While he was in the room, he said, young Carpenter said:

"Here, Mr. Patton, have a cigar. Have two or three. Mom doesn't like the smell of the smoke. You might as well take the whole box. How about it, dad?"

"Cross My Heart, Hope to Die." Patton said Carpenter agreed and Mrs. Carpenter wrapped the box in a newspaper.

"That's the truth," Patton drawled. "I hope to God I might be struck dead if that isn't the whole truth—the whole expose of the whole business."

Patton's story was enlivened by anecdotes about the marriage of his daughter, Bessie, and by a stumpy speech against the utilities bill. "Prosperity cannot return through destruction," he shouted waving his fist.

"But Witness Tells Different" On his heels came a witness who swore he had seen Patton with a box which he did not believe was a cigar box.

The witness was Eugene V. Sellers, florid-faced NRA employee and former Texas cattleman, called as the committee tried into charges a utility man passed a "box" to a congressman prior to the vote on the utility bill.

He testified he was present when Patton had a box on Sunday, June 30, the day before the house voted on the utilities "death sentence." He said that in his opinion it was not a cigar box that Patton had.

Sellers said the box was pastebored, smaller than a cigar box and that, when he carried it part of the time, "something moved."

He said Patton's nephew later said: "Hell, that wasn't cigars" in the box.

Senators closely questioned Patton about his investments, especially \$3,000 invested in baby bonds this spring. Patton, waving his arms and indignantly refuting Sellers' story, said his salary for the first four

months of this year was \$3100 and that he brought \$600 from Texas.

Problem in Mathematics "We want to give you the benefit of doubt," said Senator Ernest W. Gibson, R. Va. "We're puzzled how a man can buy \$3,000 bonds on four months' salary."

"I can refer you only to the records," Patton said, offering to present his bank books.

The box mystery has provided the strangest angle of the senate investigation which has shown expenditures of \$1,200,034 in the fight against the utility bill and disclosed sending of hundreds of faked telegrams to congressmen.
