CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 26.—(AP)—Turk Greenough, a red-headed, long-legged bronco rider, who explains the only secret in riding outlaws horses is to "go up when they do and come down when they do," today stood in a fair way to win championship honors at Cheyenne's 20th frontier days celebration.

Greenough, Red Lodge, Mont., cowboy, found himself in a favored position after he licked the brown "spinner," Broken Box, into first money for the initial "go-round" of the show yesterday.

Finishing next to Greenough in the bronco riding event were Eddie Woods, Emmet, Idaho; John Jordan, Carlsbad, N. M.; and Chuck Wilson, Cheyenne.

Ed Williams sold his house in Waldport to Clarence Huddleston, and he and his family have moved to Coquille, where they will make their home in the future.

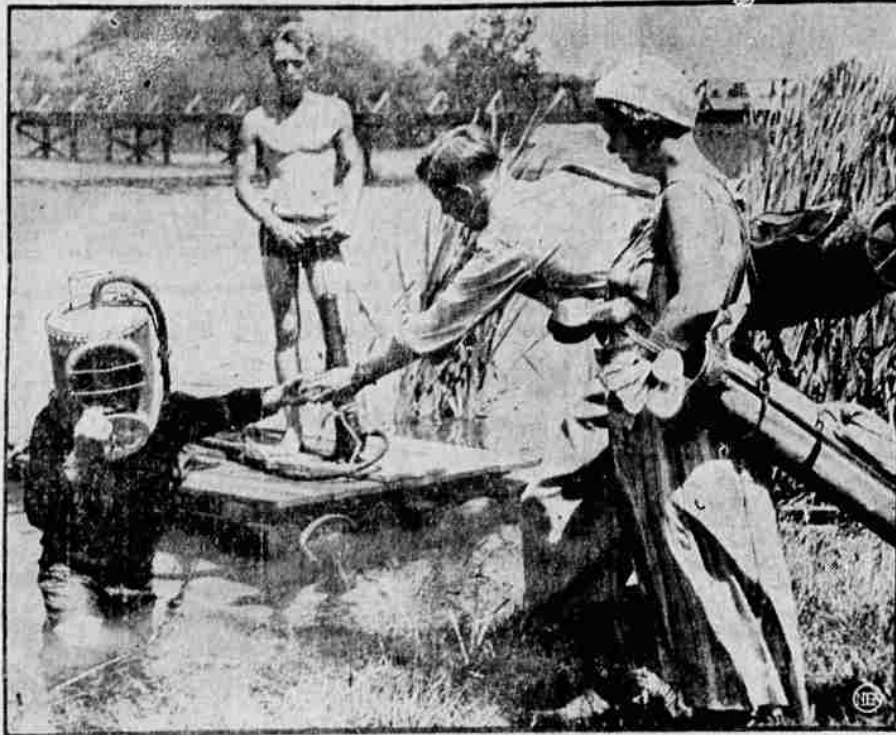
Mrs. Maxine Stoddard, of Corvallis, is spending a ten day vacation with her parents, the editor and wife.
