RELIEF SHIFT CUTS SPRINGFIELD WORK

SPRINGFIELD, July 26.—(Special)—Remodeling work on Springfield school has been slowed down during the past week by the change in relief work in Lane county, and Glenn Martin, supervisor, expects little progress until August 1, when the new system will be under way. The shift from the SERA to the Works Progress Administration, with headquarters in Salem instead of Eugene, is responsible for the present confusion. Only three carpenters are being furnished now, and only one painter. It is believed that the work will be expedited when the new set-up begins to function.
