

Social Work Training Given At Portland

THE Board of Higher Education at its July, 1935, meeting provided for the creation of a department or school of applied social science with the emphasis at present on training for social work. The new school is to be located in Portland and, beginning with the fall term of 1935, a regular course in social work will be given.

Training for relief administration, family case work, child welfare and placement and rural community service will be offered by a well chosen faculty. The course of one full year will be on a graduate basis, and will entitle the student to a graduate certificate in social work. Combined with other courses in social science it may lead to a Master's degree.

The curriculum offered in Portland is regarded as an extension of the social science work done in Eugene with the emphasis on the applied side. For admission to the department in Portland four years

of University work with a major in social science are required. Freshmen planning to enter this profession therefore should enroll at the University with a major in social science. Those who have the requisite training in social science and a bachelor's degree may enter the Portland school at the opening of the fall term.

Education Trains

The field for social work has always been an attractive and interesting one for college trained men and women and the need for such workers has been greatly increased by the depression and the expanding problems of social dependency and public relief. At present and for many years to come the demand for well trained workers will exceed the supply. Capable students graduating from a standard course of this kind are immediately assured employment in a field of expanding opportunity.

Law Research Is Done By Students

THE social sciences, as indicated above, supply the proper foundation in preparation for a course in law. Work of unusual quality in the pre-legal subjects combined with rigorous selection by the Law School itself, has enabled this professional school to keep its work on a very high plane. The advanced law students along with the faculty make their contribution to legal research and publish their articles in the Oregon Law Journal, an organ of the school.

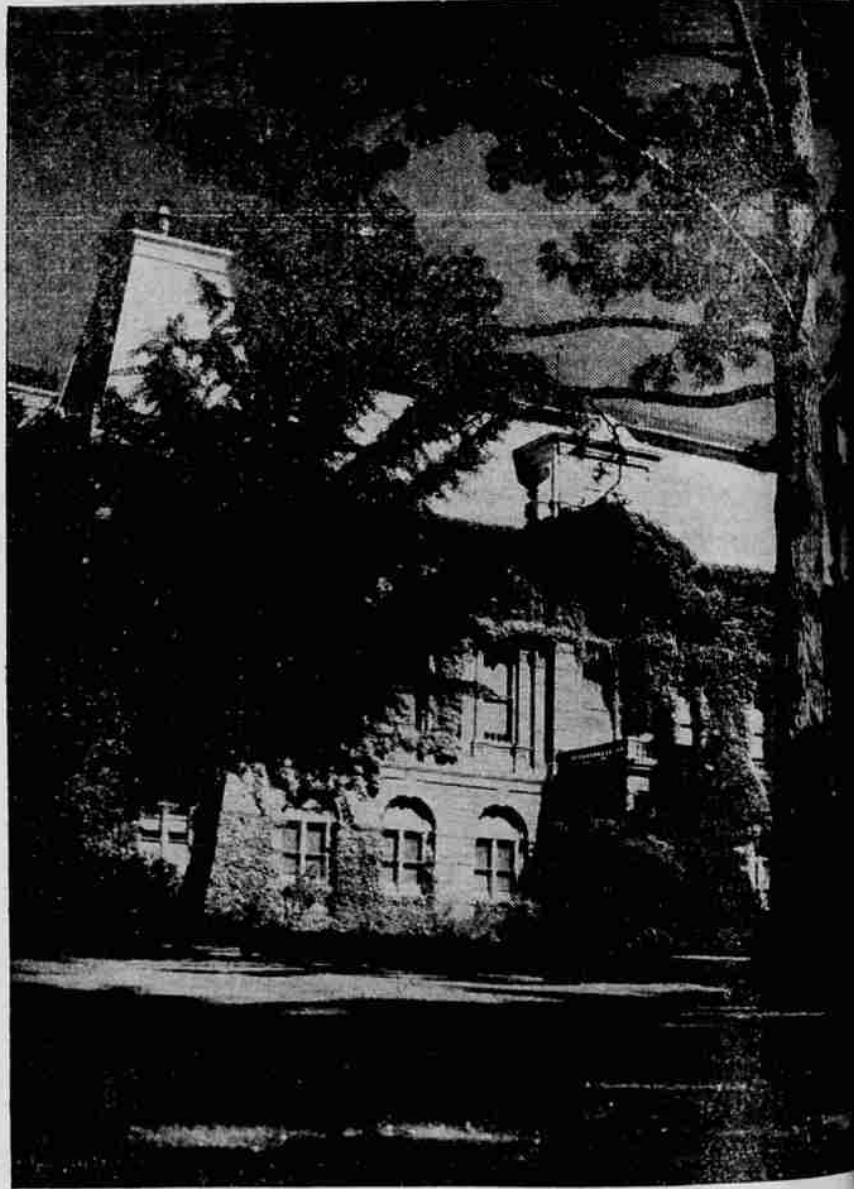
The University of Oregon Law School has won national fame for its legal researches, especially on crime and the operation of the jury system. During the last academic year the school was honored by a chapter of the Order of the Coif, which is found in only thirty of the outstanding law schools of the country. Students who graduate from the University Law School have maintained consistently a high standard of performance in the state on examination, and many of them have attained at an early age positions of prominence in their profession.

The Law School as a standard institution requires at least two years of liberal arts work in a college or university as a basis of admission. By far the larger share of entrants take three years of preliminary work. After one year in the Law School they are entitled to a bachelor's degree. Students with the bachelor's degree and with an excellent record in the professional school are entitled to the degree of doctor of jurisprudence at the time of graduation. This degree from the University School of Law is a mark of unusual distinction.

Faculty Rates High In Social Science School at Oregon

THE College of Social Science is one of the ranking schools of its kind in the west, and is placed on a par with the best schools in the entire country. Its work involves seven different divisions of social science, and it also gives foundational work for study in journalism, law, business, education, and training in good citizenship. With scarcely an exception the faculty members of this school hold the Ph.D. degree from the outstanding institutions of the country. Its faculty is likewise outstanding for its work in published writings and researches. Members of the staff serve on state planning commissions and educational commissions and act as advisers to state institutions and bureaus—an indication of the practicability of the courses offered. The school's work in training for public service is distinctive, as a roll of its graduates will testify.

tions for part-time employment are not listed, as a rule, until about the time the term opens.

3. No student should come expecting to earn money unless he knows how and is willing to work. Only those students who do their work well can succeed in obtain-

ing sufficient employment to meet their needs.

4. There is a constant oversupply of those wishing to do teaching and clerical work. None but those having superior qualifications and experience are likely to obtain employment of this type during the first term.

5. There is a considerable demand for efficient stenographers, but generally there is not sufficient work of this kind to meet the needs of all applicants.

6. Students who can do any kind of domestic or manual labor well and who have good health, can earn their board for three hours of work a day or board and room for three and one-half hours of work a day.

The employment secretary assists students in finding work. Applications should be filed in the employment office and the counsel of the secretary sought as to promising fields of employment.
