

Eugene Juniors Massacre Roseburg Team 12 To 1 In Title Series Opener

SECOND GAME SET FOR SUNDAY; IGOE HURLS 6-HIT BALL

ROSEBURG, July 27.—(Special)—Behind the brilliant 6 hit pitching of Pete Igoe, the Eugene American Legion Juniors defeated the Roseburg team 12 to 1 Saturday afternoon in the first tilt of the five-game series for the right to enter the state tournament.

Frank Fassett's Eugene team unlimbered their bats and drove two Roseburg pitchers to the showers during the course of the game. They rattled 19 hits through the home fielders, with Hamer, big second sacker, leading the parade.

Hamer Goes Wild
Hamer hit a single, two doubles, a triple and a home run in one of the greatest batting exhibitions ever seen on the local field. Stevenson of Eugene got three for five, as did Barker. Barker was the only Indian batter who could solve Igoe's southpaw slants.

The teams met again Sunday at 2 p. m. in the second tilt of the series.

Eugene opened the scoring Saturday in the first inning, with Hamer scoring on an error at third, after cracking out a double. In the second, Grube singled, Stevenson also hit for one base and Barker duplicated the feat. Igoe then got a two-bagger, and Hamer came to bat again. This time he caught Barker's fast ball for a triple, clearing the sacks.

Again in the sixth, Barker singled, Igoe sacrificed, and Hamer was up. Scherner, who had replaced Barker in the box for Roseburg, turned on the steam, but Hamer wasn't bothered, and lofted a home run over the fence to score Barker ahead of him.

Only One Error
Four more Eugene runs were chased across in the seventh, with Grube singling, Stevenson cracking out a double, Igoe reaching first on an error, and successive singles by Malters, Hamer and Manney bringing in the counts.

Eugene's last run came in the ninth as Hamer was hit by the pitcher, and Goldbar walked. Rosson singled to send Hamer home.

The only Roseburg score came in the seventh, when Dammister got a one-base hit, took second on Igoe's error, the only Eugene misplay of the game, went third on a fielder's choice, and scored on a wild pitch.

Igoe struck out 8 men, while Scherner and Kaker whiffed 10 between them.

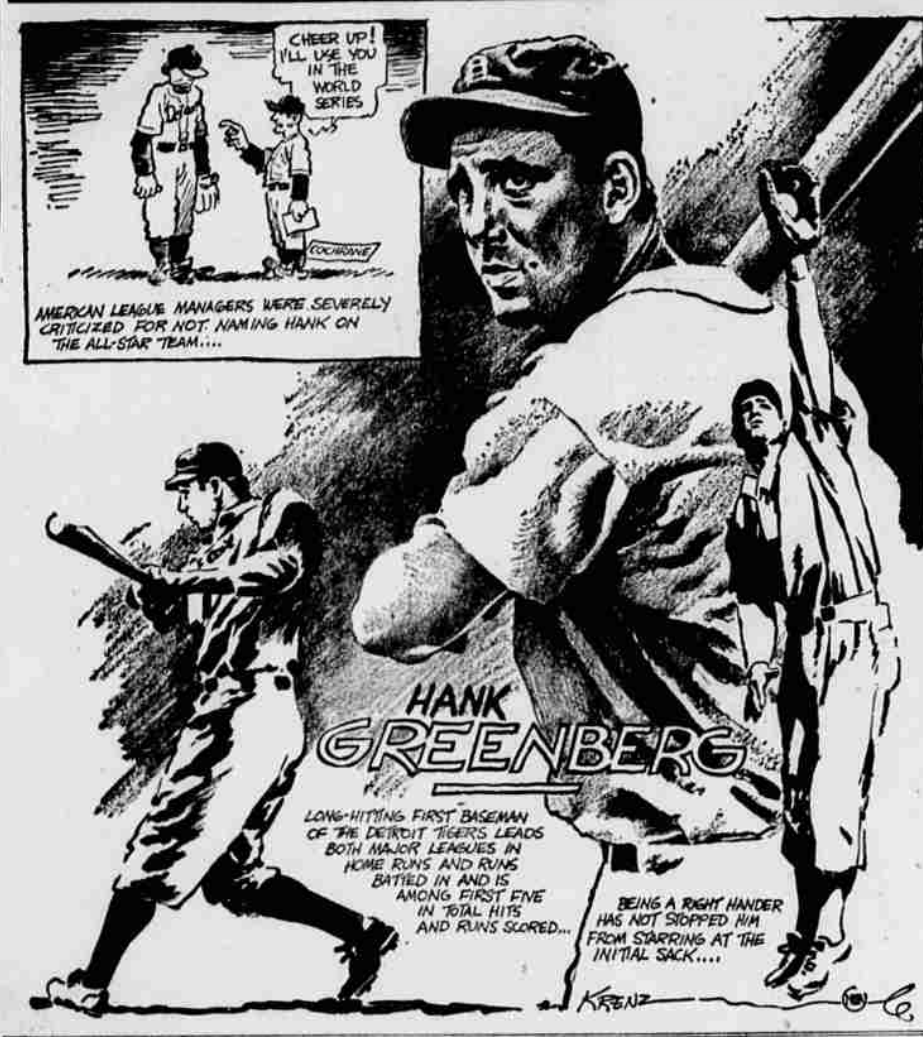

HIGHCLIMBER Takes Him Over

All over the United States, the fight game is "coming back." Here in the state of Oregon, fights are once again drawing the gates which made this section a great fight country in days gone by. Marshfield recently packed 2000 fans into the auditorium there for a regular five-bout program.

Eugene, however, is a poor fight town. It is impossible to get the best boys here, because the gates are invariably low. That Eugene may come back along with the rest of the country is a distinct possibility, however. In the meantime, fans will not be denied the slash and thud of swinging leather.

Springfield, Eugene's next door neighbor and a long-time supporter of local athletics, is slated to be the fight metropolis of Lane county during the coming winter, under a program lined up by Promoter Herb Owen, matchmaker for both the Springfield and Eugene boxing commissions.

Last spring, when the Springfield commission was organized, they retained Owen, recognizing him as the outstanding promoter in the vicinity. Fights! That's what Springfield wanted, and Owen staged a card there, bringing down LeRoy Gibson, the sensational Portland negro, and other stars. However, the Springfield armory, only available auditorium for the cards, is too small to pay off on attractions of that nature. The gate isn't enough, and Owen, like most business men, can't afford to pay fighters out of his own pocket.

So, the local promoter schum a scheme. After a layoff during the summer months, Springfield will be reopened two weeks from Monday with a regular fight card, and the fights will be continued throughout the winter, every two weeks.

Faced with the impossibility of getting Portland main events for so small an arena, Owen solved his problem in a way that should prove satisfactory to every fight fan in the county. Rather than use the few pros of doubtful ability who are available here, the winter's lineup will be composed of amateur cards!

Remember, please, that the words "amateur" and "novice" are not interchangeable. Fans may expect to see just as thrilling, ripping battles in the simon-pure fight game as they could ever expect to find in the professional ring. The quality of the bouts will be considerably better, in fact, than a series of affairs starring local boys already turned pro.

The fights in Springfield will be under the direction of Joe Bradshaw, former middleweight boxer of the Multnomah club in Portland, and organizer of the Eugene A. C. and Siuslaw Athletic club.

Here's how: Owen, as a professional promoter, cannot sponsor amateur bouts under an A. A. U. charter. Bradshaw, on the other hand, can obtain such a charter. Owen, in brief, plans to stake Bradshaw to ring, bleachers and all other necessary equipment, and sponsor him in the amateur work.

The local promoter has a double objective in mind. First and foremost, of course, is providing Springfield and Lane county with good, clean, on-the-level fights. Second, as the amateurs reach a point where Owen believes they have a promising future in the fight game, those who wish may turn pro under his guidance. Future champions may grow from the Springfield fight cards.
