SALEM, Ore., July 29.—(P)—Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle today rendered an opinion holding that municipalities and boxing commissions were liable for the injury or death of contestants in boxing exhibitions when it is proved the municipalities or commissions are negligent.

The opinion, which also held that parents of minors have no authority to release any claim in consenting to their children's participation, was asked by the state boxing and wrestling commission.

Premier's Job Too Much For Aalberse

The company's tax on paper towels for June is \$726. A permanent injunction against collection of the tax, on the ground the AAA setup is unconstitutional, was requested.

'PAY AS YOU PARK' ON CITY STREETS!



Drop a nickel in the slot and you'll be saved—from a parking fine. That's the slogan nowadays in Oklahoma City, first in the U. S. to charge a fee for street parking. Automatically, a red indicator springs up, and remains in position for 15 minutes on congested streets, longer on others. A package lemon jello. 1 pint warm water.

1 t. salt. 1 1/2 cups cabbage, finely chopped. 2-3 cup India relish. Dissolve jello in warm water, chill. Add salt to cabbage. When jello is slightly thickened, fold in cabbage and India relish. Turn into small individual molds. Chill until firm. Makes 8 molds. Prepare a luncheon plate of thin slices of cold ham, potato chips and the jello mold on lettuce. This is an attractive way to serve leftover ham. Other meats may be used in place of the ham such as cold roast pork or cold sliced tongue.—Mrs. E. C. Starmer, 1161 Lincoln street, Eugene.
