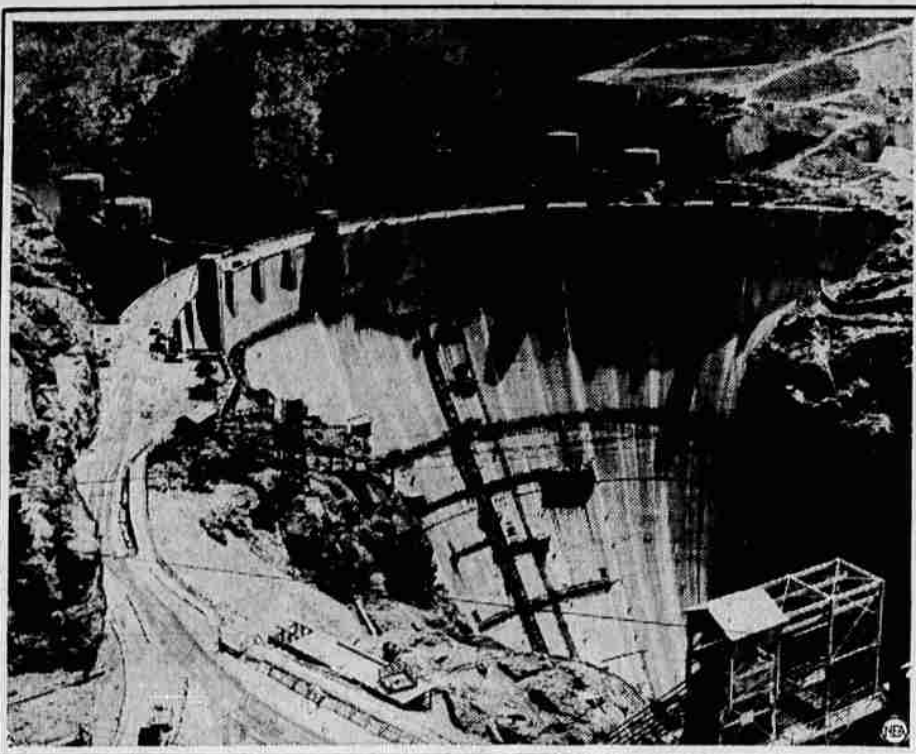

LABOR TROUBLE HITS DAM PROGRESS!



Work on Boulder Dam is almost at a standstill since labor dissatisfaction has spread through most of the crafts employed on the mammoth project. With a majority of the 1600 normally employed already idle, union machinists walked off the job, with truck drivers threatening to follow unless given assurance of a wage adjustment. The crest of the dam is strikingly shown above, with the roadway across the top which soon will be open to the public. This will afford a good route from Las Vegas, Nev., to Kingman, Ariz. Intake tower tops can be seen over the dam and the Arizona spillway is at the extreme right.

Seeing America First—

After crossing the desert in southwestern Arizona, you reach the Gila river where sufficient water is obtained to produce some crops. As we neared Phoenix, cantaloupes were seen in many fields. Apparently they have a bumper crop, for roadside stands are selling large sizes—25¢ to a crate—at 10¢ per dozen or 25¢ a crate.

Phoenix, the capital, is the only city of any size in Arizona. The state is so flat and dry that it probably never will support a very large population.

Leaving Phoenix on U. S. highway 80, we proceeded northward to Prescott, then took a side road east to the mining town of Jerome. Here is located the largest mining camp in the state, as well as the largest copper mine in the southwest. If you care to picture the town, first triple the height of the Cochrans hills, making them considerably steeper and place a town of 5000 about one-third of the way to the top, with buildings barely clinging to the steep mountain side. Space has to be leveled out to make room for the foundations. You can step from the porch of one onto the roof of the next below. As we drove at dusk down the steep, winding road through the town it seemed as though all of the 5000 people, a large percentage of whom are Mexicans and Indians, were sitting on their porches or scattered along the streets, trying to cool off after a hard day in the mines. 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TAX BILL RUSHED AS CONGRESS SEES CHANCE TO ADJOURN

WASHINGTON, July 29.—(AP)—Amid a furious campaign for adjournment of congress by the last week in August, the president's new tax bill was expanded today to boost the rates on incomes as low as \$50,000.

House ways and means committee members who are drafting the bill—which holds the present key to adjournment—ended their preliminary work by broadening it to dip into the incomes of more than 7,000 individual taxpayers. Previously it had been indicated that the rates would remain unchanged below \$150,000.

The committee has yet to consider many comparatively minor points. Nevertheless its members apparently recognized the pressure for adjournment. They arranged for the bill to be introduced formally and taken up by the full committee Monday.

Their hope was to get a new measure through the house a week from tonight.

Senate democratic leaders meanwhile were at work lining up their big majority against all amendments when the tax bill reaches the senate floor. They figured such an agreement would get the bill through the senate within a week. If this could be done it would leave ample time for congress to wind up its work before August ended.

Many obstacles, such as conference agreements on the AAA amendments, omnibus banking, social security and utilities holding company bills, nevertheless still stand in the way of prompt adjournment. But new deal chiefs insisted present differences could be smoothed out in the next month.

Compensation "Out" In Transient Cases

SALEM, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—Transient and homeless men in federal transient camps are not eligible to protection under the workmen's compensation law, Attorney-General Van Winkle had ruled today. The opinion was asked by Elmer Goudy, executive secretary of the state relief committee.

Here is one relief problem that presents a colossal job of "digging out from under," in the collapse of a seven-story Chicago warehouse where the government had stored hundreds of tons of food for the needy. RELIC OF THE GOLDEN AGE



A LITTLE over 1000 years ago, China had risen under the great Tang dynasty until its rule spread eastward to the Caspian Sea and northward almost to the shores of the Arctic. Literature and art flourished, and the times were considered the golden age of Chinese history.

One of the magnificent temples that were built in this dynasty was the famous Koyuli at Liaoyang, in southern Manchuria. Today, all that remains of this Oriental masterpiece is the lone octagonal pagoda which stands "like a giant clad in white." It rises for 16 stories to a height of 230 feet, and on its stone walls the Buddhist images are all that remain to tell the tale of its once greater days.

Nobleman's House Spared By Blazes

RENO, Nev., July 29.—(AP)—A sudden shift in the wind late today enabled 300 fire fighters to save the luxurious summer home of Christian Arthur Wellesley, fourth Earl of Cowley, from a forest fire which swept foothills north of Carson City, Nev.

The flames swept over the small Montgomery ranch house and outbuildings and crept to within a few hundred feet of the Wellesley home before the wind shifted. The summer home of Ralph Elsmann, formerly of Brooklyn, N. Y., also was threatened for a while.

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GENERAL STRIKE THREAT HARBOR MEXICAN LE

MEXICO CITY, July 29.— threatened nation-wide general strike against Acuña Olachea, governor of the northern territory of Baja California, today gave President Cardenas new cause for concern.

The national federation of oil and peasants threatened to call an early next month unless Cardenas covered Olachea. The labor union accused him of using forceful methods against opponents.

Developments in the four trouble states today, were: Tamaulipas—virtual state of civil war, including the city of Ciudad Victoria, was lifted and a number of rebellious peasants were home, confident Cardenas would Governor Rafael Villarreal, from Tampico said he would soon, having been unable to charge of "oppression" against him.

Tabasco—Tomás García, his 12-year state dictatorship by Cardenas' intervention to García as a governor, said he would not flee into exile. He would stay and "show that I can do it." He is accused of completing the slaying of four students, denies the charge.

Queretaro—A permanent committee of the federal congress met Tuesday to consider the Gov. Saturnino Osoberto, with homicide.

Chihuahua — Governor Quevedo, the other governor troubled, was confronted with a situation who protested to Cardenas the national revolutionary government party against his situation, alleging favoritism and embezzlement.
