Forest Home Project Planned At Oakridge; \$154,275 Sought From Federal Funds For Work

A forest home project, the first step in the federal government's \$500,000,000 rural resettlement program, will soon be mapped out near Oakridge, it was announced by forest officials Thursday.

DRIVE BEGUN ON TAX COLLECTIONS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today allotted \$5,112,125 of work relief funds to the treasury department for a three-fold drive to tighten up on tax collection.

Included will be an intensive check-up on income tax returns of the "little fellow" and a drive against "evasions" of liquor taxes.

White collar jobs will be employed in the work. Officials said they hoped the studies would bring increased tax revenues.

The largest allotment was \$2,448,200 for a survey of delinquent taxes and "nuisance" tax collections in 20 large cities. The bureau of internal revenue also received \$1,577,894 to check small income tax returns; and \$1,086,041 for a nationwide study of retail liquor tax evasions.

Two other white collar projects also received funds. The census bureau got allotments of \$1,804,948 for an alphabetical index of the 1900 census, and \$293,000 to determine any improvement in retail trade during the past two years.

NAZI BLACK LIST INCLUDES MASONS

BERLIN, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Masons were swept into the Nazi drive to ward state "totalism" today.

Count Lutz Schwerin von Krosigk, finance minister, ordered all employees of his great department to report by September 1 whether they belong or have belonged to Masonic lodges or similar institutions.

Those who reported themselves members, he decreed, could not be promoted — official intimation that membership was disapproved by Nazism.

The Masons joined Jews, Roman Catholics, "Steel Helmets" war veterans, oppositional pastors in the state evangelist church, "disloyal" university students, socialists and communists as objects of a drive that was gaining momentum daily.

High Chiefs of Ethiopia
Believe Strife Is
Inevitable

WAR COUNCIL HELD

New Peace Conclave Will
Be Held; F. D. Hopes
For Settlement

ADDIS ABABA, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Mass recruiting for the Ethiopian army began today in the capital.

The recruiting was preceded by a military review and a mass meeting in front of the ministry of war.

The action was taken following a war council by the high chiefs of Ethiopia, who were reported to have told Emperor Haile Selassie they believed "it may be too late now to prevent war."

Warriors Eager

One source said the emperor was gravely concerned by mounting evidence that tens of thousands of his warriors were eager for open hostilities at once to avenge what they regarded as an Italian "slur" on their ancient kingdom.

Haile Selassie, apparently anxious to do nothing to increase the tension, rebuked sternly some of the more rash leaders who were understood to have urged a breaking off of diplomatic relations with Italy.

The united loyalty of the races, or tribal chiefs, was emphasized in a manifesto issued after yesterday's secret session in the palace courtyard, asserting that no mandate of any nature over Ethiopia would be accepted.

"It is liberty—unfettered liberty—or death," one chief told the Associated Press.

"One signal of fire from the hilltop of Addis Ababa and a million men will spring to arms."

CONCLAVE PLANNED

GENEVA, Aug. 1.—(AP)—A four-power conference to discuss settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian conflict may be held at Paris or Ventimiglia, Italy, next week, it was reported here today after Premier Benito Mussolini demanded modification of the Anglo-French peace formula draft.

After receiving Mussolini's counter proposals, Laval communicated them at once to Anthony Eden, the British foreign secretary.

Go Back To What Constitution? Is Question Posed By Dean Morse

As the supreme court itself has said, "The constitution was made for an undefined and expanding future."

Thus, it behooves us as intelligent citizens to give some thought to the nature of our constitution. As Corwin points out:

"The constitution contains about 3500 words. Reading time, about 20 minutes, but hardly two per cent of this phraseology is of major significance to the student of constitutional law. A large proportion of the thousands of cases in which constitutional law is embodied stem upward from the foundational document in three or four slight phrases, the due process clause, commerce clause, the obligation of contracts clause."

Unpleasant as the thought is to the conservative, the truth is that the federal constitution as a document does not fix the constitutional rights of Americans. If you want to know what the American constitution provides and means, you must read hundreds of constitutional law decisions.

And that is not enough. You must also be able to read the minds of nine distinguished justices of the United States supreme court at any given time, in order to predict as to what extent and in what way a majority of them may differ with constitutional decisions already rendered by the court.

This is necessary because constitutional law, as Corwin points out, is one field in which the doctrine of stare decisis plays a minor role.

As to the influence of precedent, especially in the field of constitutional law, Justice Cardozo has written:

"In these days there is a good deal of discussion whether the rule of adherence to precedent ought to be abandoned altogether. I would not go so far myself. I think adherence to precedent should be the rule and not the exception. . . . I am ready to concede that the rule of adherence to precedent has been found to be incon-

by instructing its conferees to insist on barring outsiders from conferences on the measure.

The double rebuke to the administration came amid scenes of high drama.

The house first by a vote of 209 to 155 rejected a proposal of stocky Chairman Sam Rayburn, D., Texas, that the house confer with the senate on the disputed mandatory abolition of unnecessary holding companies.

Rayburn, staunchly defended the death sentence against the biting attack of Rep. George Huddleston, R., Ala., a slight figure in a blue shirt and crumpled seersucker suit whose attack on the proposed "murder" of holding companies held wrap attention of floor and galleries.

Rayburn read the United Press story of testimony of E. P. Cramer before the senate lobbying investigation.

MEN ARE ARRIVING AT TRANSIENT CAMP

Twenty-six transient workers have been sent to the federal transient camp at Linsail, according to word received Thursday by P. M. Morse, county engineer, from the state rehabilitation commission. ATROCITY SUSPECT THOUGHT SUICIDE

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—A black notebook, signed by Maxville Zenge and abandoned in a taxicab, indicated today that the reclusive sailor hunter in connection with the mutilation murder of Dr. Walter J. Bauer has committed suicide.

There was nothing in the notebook, however, to indicate that Zenge knew of the mutilation murder and its discovery left police more confused than ever in their efforts to unravel the strange murder mystery.

The note book, addressed to Zenge's father in Canton, O., and turned over to police by officials of the Yellow Cab Co., contained the hurriedly scrawled notation:

"There is nothing left for me now that I have lost Louise so I am going to end it all."

Mrs. Louise Bauer, attractive brunette nurse who married Bauer three weeks ago, formerly was the sweetheart of Zenge.
