PEORIA, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The electric chair loomed for Gerald Thompson, 26, today as a stone for ravishing and killing Mildred Hallmark, 19-year-old convent graduate, the night of June 18. Only seven weeks after the girl's battered and denuded body was found in a cemetery ditch, Thompson was under sentence of death ordered by a circuit court jury which deliberated less than four hours last night. Only two ballots were reported taken.

chill until icy cold, then whip until stiff. Fold in remaining ingredients and serve in mounds on lettuce. This salad is delicious as a stuffing for whole tomatoes or as a sandwich spread.—Mrs. James A. Welch, 1397 Lincoln St., Eugene.

Ham and Eggs au Gratin Hard cook one egg for each person to be served. Cut in two, remove the yolks and mash thoroughly. Add 1/4 as much ground cooked ham as you have egg yolks, blend with mayonnaise and pile lightly into the whites. Place two halves in each ramekin and cover with white sauce. Sprinkle grated cheese over the top and heat thoroughly in a moderate oven. Serve in the ramekin. It makes a delightful luncheon dish served with hot rolls and a vegetable salad. Also nice for picnics.—Mrs. E. K. Miller, 755 High St., Eugene.

Ham Omelette Beat the whites and yolks of four eggs separately. To the yolks add two teaspoons butter, a pinch of salt, and one cup of boiled ham finely chopped. Make a smooth paste of one heaping teaspoon of flour and one-fourth cup of milk and gradually add the remainder of three-fourths cup of milk and the well-beaten whites of the eggs.
