

RELIEF PROBLEMS BRING INCREASED FEDERAL ACTIVITY

due to the great increase in the relief needed when the depression hit the hardest, resources of these local governmental units were used up.

In Lane county, like counties elsewhere in the country, was in the line of shrinking tax returns, reductions of budgets, at the same time facing rapidly increasing relief needs.

In Lane county as elsewhere in the nation, the New Deal's vast program of direct and works relief greatly relieved the grave problems that were arising during the early winter of '33.

Records Compared Lane county's records offer some interesting statistics on handling the relief situation from 1929 to the present.

In 1929, the county spent a total of \$39,200.25 for care of the poor in 1929. Of this sum \$9,102.58 was spent on the county farm.

By 1932, the figure for care of the poor had grown to \$85,124.88. Slightly less was spent on the county farm that year, the sum being \$8,329.66.

The 1934 expenditures dropped in the total, due to the further assistance through federal money. The county this year spent \$7,301.62 on the county farm.

HENDERSON TELLS OF PIONEER CLIMB

says, "because, unacquainted as I was, I could think of no way to cross that slippery ridge. Then I noticed a jutting rock, about a foot in diameter, sticking out just at the base of the peak. I figured that if I reached that rock, I could reach the solid rock and complete the climb. In order to do this, I took a short run and scrambled across the ice ridge, my momentum taking me most of the way."

"As I neared the jutting rock, I threw myself headlong at it, wrapping my arms around it and allowing my feet to swing round on the icy slope to the solid footing on the peak. The rest of the climb was simple."

"But to get back! Henderson says he at first did not think of this feature, but as he looked back at the ridge, the realization suddenly came to him that he could not repeat the same performance as there was nothing for him to hang onto even if he could scramble back across the ice ridge."

"I have often thought what an amazing thing I had done in attempting that climb alone, even as I did as I surveyed the situation and tried to think of a way to cross that pesky ridge," chuckles the octogenarian botanist.

However, since he could not stay on top of the mountain, Henderson finally made an attempt to cross the ice, but had barely started when he slipped and started sliding down the west side of the mountain, toward certain death if he failed to stop. Digging in with fingers and toes, he later discovered his finger tips had been bruised and mutilated in trying to stop his slide—he still was unable to stop, but after a short slide, did come to a stop.

"And what do you suppose caused me to stop? It was snow which gathered under the front of my vest as I slid downward, finally acting as a brake and halting what I had begun to believe was my last slide."

Prof. Henderson does not know exactly how long it took him to edge his way across the icy slope, crawling slowly along, inch by inch, using a pitifully inadequate botanical pick to aid his progress. He remembers he left the top of the mountain at 1 o'clock, and reached the base of the mountain shortly after 8 o'clock that evening and he thinks most of this time was spent getting across that 50-foot icy slope.

Thus ended the first ascent of the North Star, made from the north side which rarely has been climbed since.

Prouty, after whom the main pinnacle of the mountain was named, made the climb from the southwest slope Aug. 7, 1910, being the first to reach the highest peak of the mountain. In talking with Henderson afterward, Prouty and others of his party "doffed their hats" to the man who had made the climb from the north side.

While he had had an extremely hard time on the icy ridge, he would have had little trouble had he been properly equipped, Henderson pointed out, and after Prouty had scaled the mountain he termed it the "worst climb he has ever had." As a result, thinking both he and Prouty had made the ascent from the same angle, Henderson at first believed some radical changes must have occurred in the mountain between the time he climbed it in 1881 and the time Prouty made the ascent in 1910. But he later discovered that since they had been talking about two different routes.

The county court at a meeting Tuesday with John Hunzicker, the architect, and R. H. Townsend, SERA engineer, agreed to submit the matter to E. J.
