

PLANS FOR FIRST AID CAR REVEALED

The proposed first aid car for Lane county, to be raised by funds from the American Legion Water Carnival next week-end, is one of the most complete of its kind.

The kind recommended for Eugene use is known as the "George L. Baker" first aid car, and is a Lincoln sedan cut for an ambulance, according to specifications held by W. E. Nussbaum, fire chief.

Included in the equipment of this car is a surgeon's kit, breathing equipment, a first aid kit, fracture equipment, and directions for an emergency fracture. A qualified first aid man will be constantly on duty, and will have easy access to city physicians.

It is estimated that this car saved 20 lives in Portland last year through its quick response and usefulness to a practicing physician or first aid man.

Tickets for the carnival went on sale Monday, and can be purchased at McMorran and Washburne, at Riggs' service station, or from any American Legion member. Contrary to previous announcement, the general admission is twenty-five cents, and reserved seats forty cents.

Subsistence gardens in Lane county will be inspected during the next few weeks with a view to ascertaining how much produce can be raised for canning purposes under the county relief setup. The relief committee at its regular meeting Monday approved an addenda to the SERA project providing for the employment of a supervisor to continue his work of checking upon the gardens. He will be employed a month longer.

Although there are no funds yet available for the payment of workers and for the purchase of materials on existing SERA projects the work will be continued until further orders are received or until the WPA takes over the projects, the committee announced.
