

Rip-Roaring Beavers Win Eighth In Row Eugene Markets Steady;

ROSE CITY CLUB ONLY HALF GAME FROM LOOP LEAD

Portland's string of eight successive victories carried Chalmers (Bill) Clissell's fighting baseball club to within one-half game of the top in the Pacific coast league today.

It was the "furbest north" in two seasons for the club from the Rose City which once dominated Coast league play.

Provided the Beavers can win today while the Seals and the Mission Reds are losing, they can climb into the driver's seat and clinch a remarkable drive which began when Clissell, former major league infielder, took over the reins from Buddy Ryan, stunned fans by trading his apparently best pitcher (Ed Ryan) for an outfielder (the bench was cluttered with gardeners at the time) and cranked up the old machine.

A little later Clissell added Bill Posedel and Ed Schulz, a couple of right-handers picked up from the Texas league, and the club really started to go places. They gave the San Francisco Seals their first setback in 10 series, stumbled momentarily against Oakland, and came back to win seven in a row last week from Sacramento.

The Beavers added their eighth last night in defeating the Mission Reds 4-3 by limping their attack on Walter Beck into two fruitful innings.

In the third Harry Davis, the league's swiftest fielding first baseman, pushed a single into the outfield. Bill Cronin followed with another, Don-

Mr. Fryrear has announced the prizes. For the bucking contest, first money will be \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. The best calf ropers will get \$25, \$15, and \$10. Ditto for the bulldogging. The rodeo will start at 1:30 each afternoon, with the horse show to follow.

SAFEGWAY 9 WINS SOFTBALL CROWN OVER RIGGS, 6-4

Although Goldsmith was stingy with hits, his wildness in the opening innings proved fatal to the Riggs cause, and two runs were walked across in the initial frame.

Safeway got three counters in the first frame, with Goldsmith walking four men before Russell singled and Scott Milligan kicked a chance. The Grocers got another tally in the second, Cheesebro scoring on an error by Sanders, after reaching second with a double.

In the fifth inning Riggs opened their scoring attack, Courtney singling and advancing on Goldsmith's infield out, after Sanders had fanned. Horner singled to bring him home, and Horner went out trying to stretch his hit.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—

An increasing supply of pullet eggs is appearing in wholesale trade here, and causing some concern because it is interspersed sometimes with peewees.

Demand for top quality eggs was

good, with buyers cautious of spurious top grade.

Storage butter stocks were increasing

as a result of curtailed demand.

Chicken prices remained unchanged,

while small operators were concerned

over city efforts to force a higher license upon the trade.

Turnover of hogs was small in view

of the high prices. Nominally the

market for blockers was around 17½c

lb.

Market for country killed calves

was strong to higher. Sales of top

were around 12½c with light and

thin nine to eleven cents and heavy

at eight to ten cents a pound.

There was good demand for medium

to thin grade cows with canners

selling 5½ to 6c and cutter around

six to seven cents a pound. Bulls

were firm at eight cents generally,

with a few higher.

Larger supplies of tomatoes brought
