EGG PRICES FALTER ON PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Egg receipts continued to decline here today. Demand for top-grade eggs exceeded supply, but the price remained the same.

Receipts of the week were less than last, and more pullet and peewee eggs appeared. Poor to ordinary eggs were reported weak.

Trading in butter continued more or less steady on the surface. Strong prices continued generally in the market for cheese, with demand improving.

Sale of local peaches continued with both the early varieties and limited offerings of Crawford's moving at full recent prices because of dissatisfaction with the California.

Strong prices held for practically all country killed meats at the week-end with only a nominal supply of hogs in sight and demand in excess. Vendors also were firm at the recent advance with lambs steady.

Unusually strong conditions ruled in the market for root vegetables here as a result of decreased stocks. Turnips were almost too scarce to quote, beets were in small supply and firmly priced and carrots of quality were below needs.

Tomatoes were the exciting feature during the week-end session of the east side farmers' wholesale market. While there were fair offerings of tomatoes during the day, demand was excessive and from the opening of the market there was a scramble among buyers for roots. Sales were made chiefly \$1.20 for good sized 2s with a few rather large at \$1.25 and even 2s as high as \$1.05 to \$1.05 box.

Demand for corn was also active, but this trade was somewhat spotted as regards prices. Sales showed general spread of 90-90c sack of 6 dozen with general trading in general stuff around 70-80c.

Cantaloupes continued firm with most of The Dalles stock around \$1.05-1.15 crate.

Market for radishes was a trifle excited. All root vegetables held well. Blackberries were \$1.10-1.15, strawberries \$2.10-2.50 and raspberries \$2 generally. A few youngberries also sold \$2 crate.

Lettuce market was practically unchanged. Cabbage held firm for top quality and up to \$1 crate.

WEEK-END PROFIT TAKING FAILS TO DAMPEN UP-TREND

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Numerous new highs for the year or longer were registered in today's brief stock market session despite week-end profit taking.

While gains generally ranged from fractions to a point or so, volume was around the largest for a Saturday in a number of months. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 1,300,000 shares.

The news from the market's standpoint, was a little mixed, but the appetite of most traders and investors for leading equities still seemed unimpaired and overnight buying orders piled up in the commission houses.

Corn Drop Sends Wheat Price Down

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Tumbles of around 2 cents a bushel in corn prices today led to late all around weakening of grain markets.

Reports of an outbreak of hog cholera gave rise to fears of acute lessening of feeding demand for corn. The cholera was said to threaten especially the radically depleted new pig crop.

Corn and wheat both closed unsteady at virtually the day's lowest level, each 1 cent to 1 7/8 under yesterday's finish, corn Sept. 75@75 1/8, wheat Sept. 89 3/8@89 1/2, oats 7-8 1/2, 1-8 off, and provisions unchanged to 1/2 cents higher.

BOSTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—The volume of sales in 64s and finer territory wools was fairly good in Boston during the past week and prices on this grade were fairly firm according to today's report of the U. S. agricultural department.

Lower grades of territory wools were mostly quiet, or at best only moderately active. Prices were fully firm on 58s, 60s half blood territory wools and somewhat irregular on 56s, three eighth blood medium combing fleece wools were moderately active at steady to very firm prices.

Ohio and similar bright fleeces however, were mostly slow but firmly quoted on strictly combing staple at 30-32 cents in the grease for 64s and finer at 30-31 cents for 58s, 60s, half blood at 31-32 cents for 56s, three eighth blood, and at 30-31 cents for 48s, 50, quarter blood.
