

SPRINGFIELD MAY ASK EUGENE FOR POWER PROPOSALS

entitled "An act to incorporate the town of Springfield, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts relating to incorporation of the town of Springfield and all acts amendatory thereof," filed in the office of the secretary of state, Feb. 10, 1935, by adding a new chapter thereto, authorizing and empowering the common council of the town of Springfield to construct, erect, purchase, acquire, maintain, own, manage, and operate a system of waterworks, and an electric system, or either of them, with all necessary plants, implements, and appliances as may be necessary and convenient for the supplying of water and electricity, or either of them, to the town of Springfield, and the vicinity, to be constructed at such time and in such manner and place as shall seem to the common council most practicable; to sell the product of either or both systems; to secure by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, all real estate, rights of way, property, water-rights, easements, and licenses, necessary or convenient for said systems, or either of them; to hold, own, construct, operate, maintain, and lease the said systems or either of them, and construct any and every structure and appliance reasonable and necessary therefor, all the foregoing to apply within and without the town of Springfield; to institute, prosecute, maintain, and defend all suits, actions and proceedings necessary to such purposes; to contract with an individual, persons, firm, or corporation, for the supplying of water or electricity to the town of Springfield, and its inhabitants, and other persons within the vicinity of the town of Springfield, or for resale by the town of Springfield, or for performance any part of such services, for said systems, or either of them, for a period of time as in the judgment of the common council shall be deemed expedient, convenient, and necessary.

The foregoing resolution and proposed amendment were filed in the office of the city recorder, on the 15th day of August, 1935.

"The following is the form and numbers in which the question will be submitted to the electors upon the official ballot:

"Proposed by resolution of the common council and referred to the electors:

"Shall the charter of the town of Springfield be amended by adding a new chapter authorizing and empowering the common council of the town of Springfield to construct, maintain, own, and operate a system of waterworks and an electric system, or either of them, for the supplying of water and electricity, or either of them, to the town of Springfield, and the vicinity, to be constructed at such time and in such manner and place as shall seem to the common council most practicable; to sell the product of either or both systems; to secure by purchase and condemnation all real estate, property, easements, and the like, necessary or convenient for said systems, or either of them, all the foregoing to apply within and without the town of Springfield; to institute, prosecute, maintain, and defend all suits, actions, and proceedings necessary to such purposes; to contract for the supplying of water and electricity, or either of them, to the town of Springfield, and its inhabitants, and other persons within the vicinity of the town of Springfield, or for resale by the town of Springfield, or for performance any part of said services, for a period of time as in the judgment of the common council shall be deemed expedient, convenient, and necessary."

The resolution and charter amendment has to be tabled for 30 days by law, and it is expected that at the next regular meeting of the council an ordinance will be passed calling for a special election in Springfield. The election ordinance has to be passed 30 days before the election. Councilmen present at Thursday's meeting were P. J. Bartholomew, E. G. Privat, Earl Thompson and Mayor E. H. Turner.

of the shelter, which was closed on the three other sides, was a solid half-salt fireplace with a heavy cast iron top large enough to cook a meal for twenty. Not six feet away was a generous pile of split wood.

A little farther over from the fireplace the McKenzie river talked cheerfully to its moss covered boulders.

At first I thought I should have to take my bucket to the river, but a CCC boy called my attention to a lava rock drinking fountain and faucet right behind the shelter.

"That ain't river water," he said. "We piped Goose Creek all through the camp. Lots of people go to the river though. They say it's colder. But Goose Creek is kept clean for drinking water."

The first thing mountain air demands is food; and in a surprisingly short time the coffee and bacon were ready. We served our dinner on what the boys who built the camp called a "bridge table"—a square log table with chairs sawed from full sized logs, backs and all, set firmly in the ground.

Who would want to play bridge out here in the woods? It's bacon and coffee and hotsauce country! Sleep when the sun goes down. Get up when the sun warms the air enough to tempt you out of your blankets. But bridge—well, there is no accounting for tastes.

After the remains of dinner (and how little is ever thrown away from a meal in camp) had been put into the convenient and not unattractive (believe it or not!) garbage pit, we decided to explore.

The whole river bank was delightfully laid out for various recreation purposes. Signs carved from cedar boards told the campers where to pitch a tent in the "tent areas," or which was the "picnic area," or where to find those indispensable conveniences which at home are called to mind by brass plumbing.

Teeter-totters for children of all ages from little ones just beginning to walk to those old enough to enjoy traveling two by two, swings graduated along the same scale; wading pools and sand piles and horse-shoe courts; chinning bars and trees especially inviting to climbing children; plenty of playground equipment was provided.

And all the while twisty trails through brown ruff and rocky drive-ways wound around so cleverly that the whole camp was a compact unit; yet privacy for every kind of party was preserved.

We passed innumerable lava rock drinking fountains and faucets, two or three registration booths with benches and great log desks for the name-record books, until we came to the council ring.

Here, in the center of camp, log benches had been built amphitheater style in a circle around a fireplace with a heavy crane on it. At one side was a chairman's desk with everything but a gavel.

At last we came to a sign TANGLE ISLAND, and after passing through a great log gate and down a bit of trail, we came to a log bridge spanning an arm of the river itself.

After we crossed, we found ourselves in a primitive area of vine maples and cascara trees and great ferns and heavy moss. No campers here; only strollers. The trail leads down close to the river's edge, and here and there massive log benches hid in inviting corners, beside rocks or trees or under over-hanging edges of the bank. "Tangle Island" ought to be a regular boathouse for summer romances!

Of course my wife and I are years past all this; but we wondered what the future might hold for our daughter, with the proper inducements, in a place like "Tangle Island."

Well, we stayed our allotted time and we went home as we had come. But our vacation had been a real one.

MARTIN DENOUNCED BY AFL OF OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Two hundred spokesmen for organized labor today placed the brand of union disapproval upon Governor Charles H. Martin of Oregon. In a report, unanimously adopted by the convention of the Oregon Federation of Labor, the governor was accused of "repulsive tactics" and "official lawlessness."

This action was taken in connection with Governor Martin's action this summer in calling the state police force into action when violence broke out during the lumber workers' strike. In the sweeping declaration of policy submitted to the Federation of Labor,

stock was sold in the open market by Rockefeller interests.

Rockefeller sought to keep the identities of the beneficiaries of his generosity secret by labeling his disposal of stock with such terms as "transferred," "disposed of," "gifts to educational and scientific corporations," and "gifts for individuals and charitable organizations."

Treasury officials estimated that Rockefeller would have had to pay \$2,077,000 in gift taxes on his new gifts at present rates. If it had been in one gift. Under the new tax bill a gift of this size would result in taxes of \$38,000,400.

If Rockefeller held the stock until after death the federal government would take in proposed inheritance taxes a total of \$55,005,100.

On Nov. 30, 1934, Rockefeller, Jr., told the exchange he owned 5,565,370 shares of Socony-Vacuum; 2,743,122 shares of Standard Oil of New Jersey and 1,872,528 shares of Standard Oil of California. At present market prices these shares would be worth \$266,629,544.

Willamette Road Contract Awarded

A low bid of \$163,200 was recommended for award today by the state bureau of public roads for the grading of 1.2 miles and the widening and clearing of 7.70 miles on the Willamette National Forest highway in Lane county, according to word received from Portland. The low bid was made by the Colonial Construction company of Spokane. Thirteen companies submitted bids which ranged as high as \$232,725. The completion of this section will leave only 10 miles in the Salt Creek area to be finished. However, this is one of the most difficult sections of the road and will, in all probability, require an appropriation of \$200,000.
