Red Plum Rolls
2c sifted flour.
2c sugar.
1/2 cup orange juice.
1/2 cup lemon rind, grated.
1/2 cup orange rind, grated.
1 1/2 cup seeded raisins, quartered.
2-3 cup stoned dates, quartered.
1/2 cup blanched, shredded, almonds.
3 egg whites.
1 tsp. vanilla.

Soften gelatin in milk. Scald together coffee, sugar, cinnamon, and cloves, strain into gelatin, stir until dissolved. Add orange juice, salt, orange and lemon rind, cool and when almost beginning to set, add raisins, dates, nuts, vanilla and beaten egg whites. Blend all thoroughly. Turn into mold, chill, and serve with boiled custard.—Miss Patricia Plinsky, 1145 Lincoln.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, sift again, cut in shortening, add milk gradually, stirring until soft dough is formed. Turn out on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds, or enough to shape. Roll 1/4 inch thick. Cover with plums and roll as for jelly roll. Moisten edge and press against roll. Cut in 1 1/2 inch slices. Place in pan, cut-side down and pour plum sauce over them. Bake in hot oven (425F) 30 minutes, or until done, basting often. Serve hot with a tablespoon of whipped cream on each slice, if desired. Serves six.

Sauce for red plum rolls:
1c sugar.
1 tablespoon flour.
1/4 cup orange juice.
1c plum juice.
1c water.
1 tablespoon butter.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Combine sugar, flour, and salt. Add fruit juice and water and boil 3 minutes. Add butter and lemon juice and serve hot.—Mrs. R. O. Evans, 318 Adams.

2 T. gelatin.
1 cup milk.
1 pt. strong coffee.
1 cup granulated sugar.

Post Session Has Enrollment of 199

If the University of Oregon officials add a hundred to the famed hymnal "99," they can have as the interinstitutional post session theme song, "There were hundred-and-ninety-nine in the fold," for a total of 199 students have registered for the session. This number is a slight slump over last year, when at the same time, 221 students were enrolled.

Of the present total, 110 are undergraduates and 80 graduate students. Men lead the post session knowledge parade with 121 to their credit, as against the 78 women who dared to brave the tropical weather which is blessing the campus this early August.

The session began August 5, and will end August 30. A total of 44 courses are being offered by 16 professors, and cover the fields of economics, education, English, history, law, physics, psychology and sociology.
