

BUSINESS PICKUP CONTINUES; GAINS ARE WELL SPREAD

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Continued vitality of most divisions of business enabled business to continue to show gains of this week. Wholesale buying increased its tempo from 15 to 40 per cent above the comparative 1934 level.

Best gains were less emphatic than in the preceding week but continued well above the corresponding period. New England states reported a definite upturn of 4 to 8 per cent, while the entire east was up 5 to 12 per cent. The northwestern states were up as high as 35 per cent under the stimulus of moving crops and high prices for hogs. Wholesale markets were crowded all week. More emphasis was placed on better grades of merchandise than last year. Fewer complaints were registered regarding price trend in the opening for the first time this summer. Percentage gains over the corresponding 1934 period were particularly large in men's and women's clothing, accessories, gift wares, linens, curtains, table silver and jewelry.
