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PORTLAND LIVESTOCK

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP)—An erratic swing marked the Portland butter market today.

After rapid gains in production over preceding periods, centralizers were showing a sizeable loss as compared with last week while the country appeared to be more in favor of sending supplies to Portland.

This was believed by some the result of high prices which would give a greater net to shippers than could be secured elsewhere along the coast.

Receipts of butter were reported greater for the week in San Francisco also, while Los Angeles showed a small increase.

Egg receipts increased with suggestion of a greater lay of pullets and even of the peewee size. Prices held for fresh stuff although the word "fresh" is not recognized by law.

Demand for live chickens continued, with shortage of small stuff evident. Prices were maintained.

Cheese receipts increased here this week in contrast to decreases at San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Prices of country killed meat remained high and demand continued in excess of supplies.

Great strength was suggested considering the season in the east and tomato trade. Both showed smaller supplies than normal, and demand placed prices firm to higher.

Cantaloupes showed particular strength at the east side farmers' market.

Prices in the main were strong to fully a dime higher than the previous day with sales in a limited way at \$1.00 crate and most business at \$1.50 straight. This latter also applied to pear melons from the Willamette valley.

Tomatoes were in rather active call at firm to fractionally better prices. Market for top quality and good continued 75c box but some business was shown at 80c to 90c box.

Potatoes were rather slow and perhaps a nickel lower with a general extreme of 75c orange box.

Peas were 3 1/2 to 4c lb. generally with green beans easy around 3c generally and young in a small way to 4c as were shell stock.
