### GRIEF FELT HERE

Eugene Legionnaires, shocked at the death of their comrade, Olaf Nelson, who died as a result of pneumonia received at the hands of a prankster at the state Legion convention held in The Dalles, expressed their grief today at his passing. Said Hugh Rosson, commander of the local post, "The Legion here feels keen and terrible loss with the passing of Olaf Nelson. He was a member of the 40 et 8 in Eugene and we felt that he was almost as much a member of this post as he was of Oakridge. He was the finest type of a man and his carefree and happy spirit and disposition greatly added to the Eugene groups. He was respected and admired by all Legionnaires."

"Ole was a grand fellow," said Bryant DeBar, "and I am greatly grieved to learn of his death. All of us had hoped to the last that he might recover. His loss will be felt as keenly here as in Oakridge."

Mr. Nelson had lived at Oakridge for the past 11 years where he was engaged in the garage business. His mother, Mrs. Carrie Berg, lives at Astoria. His wife, from whom he was separated several years ago, lives at Monmouth with his daughter, Verla. Also surviving are two half brothers, Emil and Julius Berg of Astoria. Details of his life were not available here Tuesday.

The A. J. Rose mortuary in Portland has charge of the body.

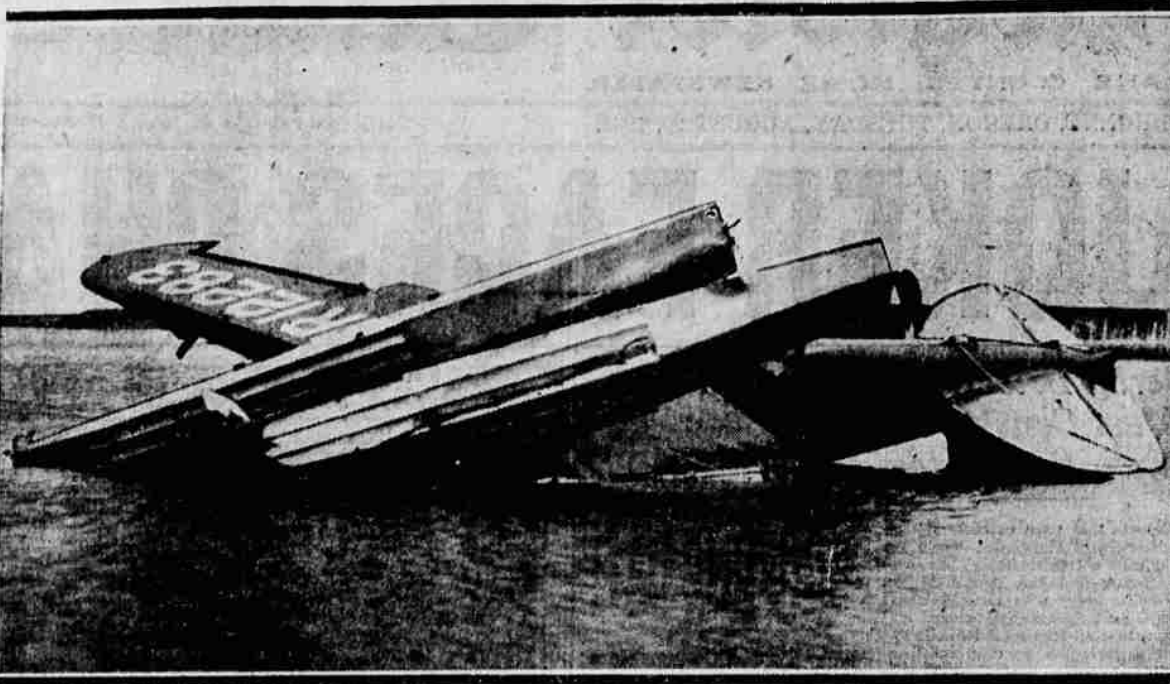

The first pictures of the airplane wreck in which Will Rogers, famous humorist, and Wiley Post, equally famous pilot, met their deaths fifteen miles south of Point Barrow, Alaska. This photo shows the wrecked plane, upside down, in the shallow water, not far from its take off point. The smashed pontoons are especially clear. Only one wing, the left, can be seen, the right wing having been torn off in the impact of the fatal landing against the icy hummocks of the frozen tundra.

**HIGH HONORS PLANNED** OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Aug. 20.—(AP)—While a transport plane bore the body of Wiley Post toward Oklahoma today, tentative plans were made to place it in a temporary burial place here until it can be decided whether the aviator is to rest in Arlington National cemetery.

Friends of the family said the late aviator's body in the conduct of national heroes if it is possible. The plans of the parents to conduct simple services under the shade trees at their small farm were abandoned today and instead the body will be taken to the Landmark Missionary Baptist church where it will lie in state four hours.

Late in the afternoon the body will be returned to the funeral home here. From 10 a. m. Thursday noon the body will lie in state in the rotunda of the Oklahoma capitol.
