1/2 T Orange Pekoe tea.
2-3 c. sugar.
1 c. corn syrup.
1 c. loganberry juice.
Juice of 2 1/2 lemons.
Pulp and juice of 3 oranges.
1 banana (pressed through sieve or ricer).
2 c. ginger ale.
Pour boiling water over tea and let stand 10 minutes. Strain. When cool add other ingredients and chill. If too rich, add iced water. Just before serving add ginger ale.—Mrs. Lou M. Pope, Monroe.

1/4 c. cold water.
Juice of 1 orange.
1 tablespoon sugar.
Lemon juice.
1 egg white.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Marie Jose, the pretty brunette daughter of Premier Pierre Laval, became a countess today—without a dowry. Her civil marriage to Count Rene Adolphe de Chambrun also made her

a citizen of the United States. The count, a nephew of the late Speaker Nicholas Longworth, by law is an honorary citizen of the United States because he is also a descendant of General Lafayette. His bride, under French law, takes the nationality of her husband, hence both are citizens of France and the United States.

BATTLE OF THE FALLEN TIMBERS

"MAD ANTHONY" WAYNE he was called, but his reckless daring and brilliant courage have gained an important place for this great revolutionary general in the annals of American history.

In 1929, the United States issued a two-cent stamp in commemoration of General Wayne's successful exploit on Aug. 20, 1794, against the Indians on a field of fallen timber, on the Maumee river about 15 miles from Toledo, O.

Some 2000 Indians, with about 70 white rangers, French, English, and renegade Americans, were defeated by his 3000 men, many of whom were Kentucky volunteers. It was the greatest defeat suffered by the molesting Indians of the northwest territory and led to the treaty of Fort Greenville, which turned over a large tract of land in that area to the United States.
