**Exam For Annapolis, West Point is Set**

A civil service examination will be held to determine eligible applicants for appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, and the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., on October 26.

The First Congressional District of Oregon will have one vacancy at each academy in 1936. Any young unmarried man not less than sixteen years of age nor more than twenty years of age on April 1st may compete for the Annapolis appointment. Candidates for the West Point vacancy are eligible for admission from the date they are seventeen until the day they become twenty-two years of age and must be unmarried.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that the applicant notify Congressman James W. Mott at Salem, Oregon, not later than September 15th of his desire to participate in the examination.
