He was a son of Thomas J. and Hilda Cheshire, early Lane county pioneers, a nephew of Mrs. F. A. Rankin of Eugene and a cousin of Major General Creed C. Hammond, formerly of Eugene and now living in Portland.

Following his education at the University of Oregon and Portland Business college, he engaged in the restaurant business in Eugene and went from here to Prosser, Wash. where he was engaged in the hardware business. Later he conducted a similar business at Milton, Ore., and was elected county judge on the republican ticket in 1932. His widow and a son, Creed, survive.
