were expressed that recognition of the Soviets would:

1. "Regularize" trade and political relations between the two countries.
  2. Result in a stream of false orders from Soviet Russia for American products, particularly for steel, pipe and machinery.
  3. Bring about a settlement of the approximately \$200,000,000 of American claims against Soviet Russia for American property seized or destroyed by the Soviets.
  4. Develop a powerful friend and ally in Russia in far eastern matters.
  5. Provide some official Soviet supervision, control and restraint over the activities of the Communist International organization whose activities in advocacy of a "world revolution" had long been a source of irritation to the United States.
- The sessions of the seventh all-world congress of the Communist International, at which speeches were made and resolutions introduced directing the communist party in the United States to "bore from within" in American labor organizations, were considered the "last straw" by state department officials. The protest by Bullitt represented the opinion of these officials.

## OTHERS PROTEST

LONDON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Reports were received here today that England, Italy, and Latvia had protested informally to Russia over the activities of the third international before the United States protest was made in Moscow yesterday.

It was stated England made a verbal protest to the Soviet just before the close of seventh congress, Aug. 20, and that was not the first British protest.

It was said the British protest was informal and no publicity was given to it.

## Shunned Social Spotlight

But Will Rogers lived simply, as befitted a simple man. He didn't drink, smoke, or chew (except gum, which helped him keep from smoking). He didn't go to night clubs or first-nights. He didn't go in for the social swim, and his attitude toward such things is well exemplified in a story often told in Hollywood:

A swanky Hollywood hostess invited Will to a dinner, but did not include Mrs. Rogers in the invitation. Will went, and was asked to entertain. He did so, but later sent the hostess a bill for services rendered. When she protested that he had been a guest, Will answered, "I am never a guest when Mrs. Rogers is not invited."

This devotion to Mrs. Rogers and this distinction between his public and private life was characteristic of Will Rogers, and was one of the things many Hollywood folks found hard to understand.

## Horses His Hobby

He was modest about his Santa Monica ranch, saying, "Oh, yes, I have a weed-patch out there, and I feed a few horses."

But he was secretly proud of it, and enjoyed it thoroughly. While there, he usually arose at 5 a. m. His latchstring was literally always out to his friends. They knew he kept the key in a notched hole on one side of the gatepost.

He loved his horses, and loved to play polo because it necessitated really skillful and hard riding. He had no interest in the pink tea aspect of polo. He usually played in denim pants and a flannel shirt, even when the rest of the players were in immaculate whites. But he was no clown at the game. His three-goal rating was official.

## He'd "Dress" for Stones!

His dislike of formal dress was genuine and deep-seated. When he consented to "dress up" for a formal dinner or party, that meant a blue serge suit and black bow tie. One of the few times he consented to dress formally was at the debut of Paula Stone, daughter of his old friend Fred Stone. It was his way of showing his love for the Stones.

To every great star of stage or screen the "benefit racket" becomes a cross to be borne as patiently as possible. All sorts of dubious proposals demand their aid. Yet when the thing was on the level, no one was more generous of his time and talents than Will Rogers. A half dozen tours benefited the Red Cross in time of need.

The local chairman asked Will to speak at a Negro church. Will said he would if they would sing him a couple of spirituals, which were his favorite music.

Will told later that there were 500 voices in the choir, and that more than 2000 people overflowed the church.

## Never Collected His Bets

"It developed into a contest," he drawled. "I'd tell a few jokes, and they would ask for a few more. I'd agree if they'd sing another spiritual, and they'd agree to sing another song if I'd tell some more stories. It went on until both of us was pretty near wore out, but it was one of the most memorable evenings I've ever spent anywhere."

He loved to bet. But he would never collect when he won, though he was always more than prompt to pay off when he lost.

No big spectacular charities marked his course through Hollywood. But no sooner was his death announced than hundreds of little people began to recall the times when Will Rogers had helped them out. Three Boy Scouts whose expense he had advanced to pay to the national jamboree in Washington. Things like that.

## Example in Gentle Living

The Fairbanks, Alaska, baseball team is playing in the Discovery Day celebration at Dawson right now, aided by \$100 contributed to them by Rogers just before his departure for Nome with Wiley Post.

It was in little things like this that Will Rogers showed Hollywood a living example of how to be simple though rich, modest though famous, and in every relationship kindly and gentle.

On the high plateau overlooking Santa Monica Bay where lies Will Rogers' ranch, everything is unnaturally quiet and still today. On the hooks in the tack room the ropes and lariats hang motionless.

Continue until dish is filled. Cover the top with buttered bread crumbs. Bake in a hot oven (350 degrees) 20 to 25 minutes, until crumbs are brown.—Miss Mary Endres, 1144 Lincoln St., Eugene.

## Crooks Tomatoes

- 4 large tomatoes
- 1 small onion
- 2 green peppers, finely chopped
- 1 cup milk and cream
- Salt and cayenne
- 4 level tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour

Cut the tomatoes in halves crosswise; lay out side up in a baking pan and sprinkle with the finely chopped onion; also the peppers from which the seeds and veins have been removed. Season highly, put a small piece of butter on each piece of tomato, using two tablespoonsful for the purpose. Pour half a cup of water into the pan, and bake in a quick oven, till the tomatoes are tender. Melt the remaining two tablespoons of butter and brown the flour in it; add milk and cream, also the liquor from the baking pan, stir till boiling and cook three minutes longer. Dish the tomatoes on squares of lettuce and pour the sauce around them.—Mrs. W. E. Sanborn, Lorane route, Cottage Grove.

## Tomato-Tuna Salad

- 1 cup tuna, broken into fairly large pieces
  - 1 cup cold cooked rice
  - 2 large tomatoes, peeled and diced
  - 1 cup celery, diced
  - 3-4 cup mayonnaise
  - 1 dozen ripe olives
  - Parsley (may be omitted)
  - Lettuce
- Mix all but the last two ingredients together lightly with a fork. Season to taste. The parsley may be minced and added, or left to decorate the finished salad with the olives. Use the crisp lettuce for cups in serving. Served with coffee, crisp buttered rolls, and a fruit ice, this salad forms a well-balanced, satisfying meal.—Mrs. Arthur R. # NATIVES EVACUATE ETHIOPIAN CAPITAL

may come at any moment, departed for villages in the interior.

The Ethiopian government today warned the United States and other legations that the inventories of properties which the legations ordered their nationals to prepare—ostensibly with a view to possible indemnification by Italy or Ethiopia in the event of damage by war—will not be recognized by Ethiopia.

The warning was issued as the Ethiopian thaler fell sharply and Emperor Haile Selassie and his empress began a month of prayer and abstinence from meat.

## IL DUCE WANTS GIFT

LONDON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Certain informed neutral quarters said tonight that Premier Mussolini may tell the league of nations that his price for calling off the threatened invasion of Ethiopia is a gift by other powers of colonies in Africa.

Meantime, the British government speeded up the movement of troops and naval forces towards strategic points on the British route of empire. Mussolini's references to the colonial problem were noted in the foreign office where the delicate colonial question has been under consideration since Reichsfuehrer Hitler demanded the return of some of Germany's lost territory.

## Problem Acute

The British government was represented as believing the colonial problem is an international matter which can only be decided by the powers in joint conference, but there was no sign that Great Britain would permit any sudden parity forced by the present turn of events in Africa. Circles in close touch with the Italo-Ethiopian dispute said Mussolini might endeavor to get the support of Hitler before making any demands for colonial gifts. Such action, they said, would be regarded as an effort to make the question international instead of individual.

## Troops Sent Out

The war office announced today the fixed defenses at Aden, Arabia, as well as at Malta, would be brought up to strength already approved.

Troops are being assembled at Southampton for dispatch to these two posts—key points along England's "lifeline of the empire," which begins at Gibraltar and ends at Aden after the Suez canal passage.

Confirming that Malta and Aden defenses would be reinforced with units of royal artillery engineers and signal corps, the war office, however, specified these were the only moves to be made now.

# FLORENCE'S BEACH ROAD MAY BE FIXED

FLORENCE, Aug. 26.—(Special)—There is a live prospect afoot of the new river road directly from Florence's business section to Heceta beach receiving a coating of gravel, although Patrolman Dave Whipple has nothing to say regarding the matter at present. Road work in general is at a low ebb just now in these parts, according to Mr. Whipple's report. A few small bridges have been built in needed places.

Florence citizens are being warned to be economical in the use of city water for the time being. The trouble appears to be that the municipal supply has receded to below the screen points in the water system. It is not a serious matter, according to the members of the water commission of the city council, and it is something which can be remedied, they say.

The members of the city council and of the committee for drawing up the yearly budget for the city met again the other evening, with R. S. Bryson of Eugene present to lead a hand. Bryson is well informed on preparing estimates for city expenditures and

his talk on the matter proved a valuable aid to the framers of the local budget.
