

PLANNERS ASKED TO STUDY MERGER

SALEM, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Governor Martin today sent a letter to V. B. Stanbery, chairman of the state planning board, requesting that the board conduct an investigation as to the feasibility of consolidating Marshfield and North Bend.

The board was asked to submit a confidential report immediately upon completion of the investigation.

The report would cover the history and growth of the two cities involved in the merger, the industrial activities, and the procedure necessary in handling the debts of the corporations.

The board also was asked to discuss the acquisition of a 3,800-foot strip of land lying between the two cities and the location of a city hall for the consolidated municipalities.

Governor Martin said the consolidation apparently was desired by a large majority of the citizens of Marshfield.

"The consolidation of these two cities would reduce the costs of government and go a long way toward building up a prosperous industrial center," the governor stated.

BOARDS' STATUS TO BE EXPLAINED

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 27.—(AP)—County planning commissions will know this week what authority, if any, they have.

At the request of the Lane Commission, Governor Martin asked V. B. Stanbery, executive secretary of the state planning board, and E. J. Griffith, state WPA administrator, to give him their views on the functions of county planning commissions.

Lane's planners felt slighted last week when C. C. Hockley, state WPA administrator, indicated they were not as important as they thought. The executive office here said Hockley's statements must have been misinterpreted.

"Being appointed by the governor would give the planning boards an appearance of authority although they are really unofficial," W. L. Gosselin, the governor's secretary, said. "Governor Martin will make their status clear in an official statement."

1 pkg. strawberry jelly
1 pt. warm tomatoes
2 teaspoons prepared horseradish
1 1/2 teaspoons scraped onion
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
Dash of cayenne.

Dissolve jelly in warm tomatoes, add horseradish, onion, salt and cayenne. Force through sieve. Turn into individual molds. Chill until firm. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 4.

Deviled Tomatoes
4 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons powdered sugar
1 teaspoon mustard
1/2 teaspoon salt
Few grains cayenne
Yolk hard boiled egg
1 egg slightly beaten
2 tablespoons vinegar

Wipe, peel and cut tomatoes in slices, sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour, and saute in butter. Remove to a hot serving dish. Add sugar, mustard, salt, cayenne and yolk of egg. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens.—Viola DeArmond, 67 Washington St., Eugene.

may be necessary to call a special meeting of the board in order to make the application before the deadline date.

When C. C. Hockley was in Eugene on August 19, he termed the announcement of the September 16 deadline a "bombshell," and said that many organizations would be cramped for time in which to submit their applications. The new deadline cuts two weeks off the old period.

Other Eugene and Lane county projects were not affected by the unexpected change in plans.

County Judge Fred Fisk announced that Lane county had already filed its application for a sum of nearly \$6,500 to construct fire-proofed storage vaults at the courthouse. The Oakridge crossing project, for which it has been planned to request PWA funds, will be presented to the state highway commission for approval as a highway project.

University library officials revealed that the supplemental application to obtain more than \$100,000 to complete the appropriation for the new University library was completed and would be in the hands of authorities long before September 3. It was explained that the deadline did not affect the supplemental grant, as it was merely an addition to the already approved library application, and not a new application.

Dr. James H. Gilbert asserted that the reduced application period would make impossible the hoped-for application for funds to the University campus. University officials have been contemplating the erection of a new gymnasium for some time, and it was thought that an application could be filed before the September 16 deadline.

Funds for the new city maintenance plant will be secured from PWA and will not be sought as a PWA project.

plained. "We are compelled to follow the rules and regulations."

To Reduce Force
Plans to reduce the office force of the relief administration shortly after Sept. 1 were being made Tuesday by Mr. Crowe. On this date all men on relief rolls are supposed to be working but, the administrator pointed out, this will not be possible for the reason that only one Lane county WPA project has been approved and that one will give work but to a comparatively few. The present force will continue for at least ten days, he said. The budget of the relief committee for September provides for the laying off of ten persons, but the force may have to be augmented after the layoff is made for the reason that there is apparently little prospect of many men being put to work very soon and the relief work will have to be continued if WPA projects are not put under way.

It is planned to vacate three of the rooms now used in the Broadway building by the relief administration but these will be occupied by the resettlement and rehabilitation administration which has been cramped for room for some time past.

Rossman Homesite Bought By Striker

W. K. Striker of Eugene has bought the old Rossman homesite of five acres across the road from the River Road school north of Eugene from Harold Rossman.
