PRO GRIDDERS WIN FROM ALL-STARS IN RAIN-SOAKED GAME

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—(AP)—By the grace of Jack Mander's talented toe and a bit of luck the professional Chicago Bears laid claim today to supremacy over the best football players the nation's colleges can produce.

But their glory was as diluted as the watery cheers of 77,450 customers who saw them squeeze out a 5 to 0 victory over the collegiate All-Americans in a downpour of rain at Soldier field last night, and went away still arguing.

Is the best professional team better than the best college team? The record would indicate that the footballers who play for pay won because they staked more power. They lost almost as many yards from penalties for rough-housing as the all-stars gained.

Rain Gets Blame
"It was that damned rain," said Coach Frank Thomas, the Alabama mentor of the collegians. It turned what started out to be a great wide-open game into a battle where the style was cramped.

Without the rain the professionals' triumph probably would hang by the thin thread of a three-point victory. Shepherd, Western Maryland's half-back who was top-scorer of the country last fall, wouldn't have sprawled over a messy pass from center, fumbled behind his goal and given the Bears two points on a safety.

The Bears, smarting from a scoreless tie with last year's crop of All-Americans, learned in the first ten minutes the defensive strength of their opponents and immediately called on the barrel-necked Manders to put his best foot forward and boot across a 27-yard kick from placement.

More Lost Downs
The benefits of Manders' right foot, which has failed once in 30 such attempts for the Bears, came after the All-Stars had repulsed the pro-men on the two-yard line.

Despite 112 yards in penalties, the pros gained 166 yards to the All-Stars' 127. Of their yardage the Bears made 150 yards from knock-about scrimmage. The Bears tallied 10 first downs, the All-Stars six.

Passes were ineffective as the ball, limping like a water-logged soda cracker, sloshed to the ground short of intended receivers. The Bears completed two of 11 attempts, the All-Stars two out of nine.

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Goin' Fishin'?

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following information is collected from sources which we deem reliable and is passed on to readers of the Register-Guard for use as they wish. Since fishing conditions may change overnight, please do not hold the writer responsible for any change over which he has no control. Should you have a good catch, or should you run into something of interest to other fishermen, this column will serve as a means of passing it along. The column will appear every Friday, and is written by Dick Mattison, well known Eugene fisherman.

All reports from east of the mountains are good. Limit catches by even the amateur fisherman on the Deschutes river from Pringle Falls to Sheep Bridge. Dry fly, wet fly or eggs.

East lake is at its best right now. Dr. "Buck" Buchanan reports more fish than he knew what to do with. The largest a good eighteen inches. All on a Doc Shelton trolling with worms. North Fork of the Willamette is good. Camp at the North Fork bridge. Use dry fly or eggs. Mostly small fish but a twelve or thirteen inch possible.

Nearly bass fishing only fair. Early morning or late evening is the best bet.

Upper Willamette not so good. Fish are apparently still on the bottom. Bert Vincent reports that dry fly fishing is getting better above Blue River between eight and eleven a. m. and the last hour before dark. A catch of 15 reported from Bear creek riffle on single eggs. Carl and Otto Koppke fishing from John Hall's boat caught 12 nice ones on spinner and bait from Hell Gate to Black Canyon on the Willamette.
