SWIMMING, TENNIS SCHEDULES READY

Schedules for swimming and tennis classes for children, girls and women at the University of Oregon for the summer have been made. It has been announced by those in charge. Classes will meet each Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Classes in swimming will start at 9 a. m., when boys and girls 10, 11 and 12 years of age will meet. At 9:40 boys and girls 5 and 9 years will be given instruction, at 10:20 boys and girls of 6 and 7 will be taught, and at 11 a. m. girls 13 to 15 years of age will swim. The class for women will be held at 7:30 p. m. All swimming classes will meet in the pool of Gerlinger building.

The class for tennis for children will be held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 3 a. m. Russell K. Cutler will have charge of this instruction, while Miss Helen Pavlicus will have charge of children's classes in swimming and Miss Augusta Heiberg will instruct the girls and women.

The continuance of all the classes will depend upon the attendance at the opening sessions Monday, it is stated, so all interested are urged to be present on this first day. The fees for swimming will be \$1.50 for the course for morning classes and \$2.50 for the evening class.

MINING CONFAB SLATED FOR BAKER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(Special)—A session of utmost importance to the mining industry in Oregon has been called at Baker, Friday, July 5, it was announced here today by H. F. Byram, research assistant for the Oregon State Planning board, who is assisting with arrangements for the event.

The meeting will be held under the auspices of the Eastern Oregon Mining and Mineral Association, and will have as speakers Governor Martin, Senator W. A. Strayer, G. F. McDougall, mining engineer, Dr. Warren D. Smith, professor of geology and geography, University of Oregon, and others.

Consideration of the tentative draft of legislation to create a mining and geological department for the state of Oregon will be considered at this time, it is announced. This will be discussed at an open meeting, so that practical mining men may express opinions on sections of the proposed measure.
