PROFESSIONAL SOLDIER!



Lieut. Bert Hall, otherwise known as General Chan, once Chinese war lord and leader of China's air forces, who will speak at the Armory on Wednesday night on the subject, "The Next War." He will relate some of his most exciting experiences as a professional soldier of fortune, as well as his views on future conflicts during his Eugene appearance.

"General Chan" Coming to Armory; Famous Professional Soldier to Tell Of Adventures, Describe Next War

Lieut. Bert Hall, perhaps the world's most famous professional soldier and adventurer, will appear in person at the Armory next Wednesday evening and will speak on the subject of "The Next War." It is a subject on which he is an admitted authority, as Hall has a longer actual war record than any other living man, having fought under the flags of eleven different nations in the past twenty-five years.

That "war is his business" has often been said of Hall. He is at present residing in the northwest, after having recently returned from China, where he was known as "General Chan" in charge of the Chinese air force. But his war record extends back to 1912, when he was the first man ever to use the airplane in combat warfare, when he was the "one man flying force" in the Turkish army. Next he fought for the Bulgarian government, and then joined the French Foreign Legion, in which he was enlisted when the world war broke out. During this conflict, he fought for the French, and is today the only living member of the famous Lafayette Escadille flying corps.

Then came Russia during the revolution. Peru, Mexico, various South American governments, and more lately, China.
