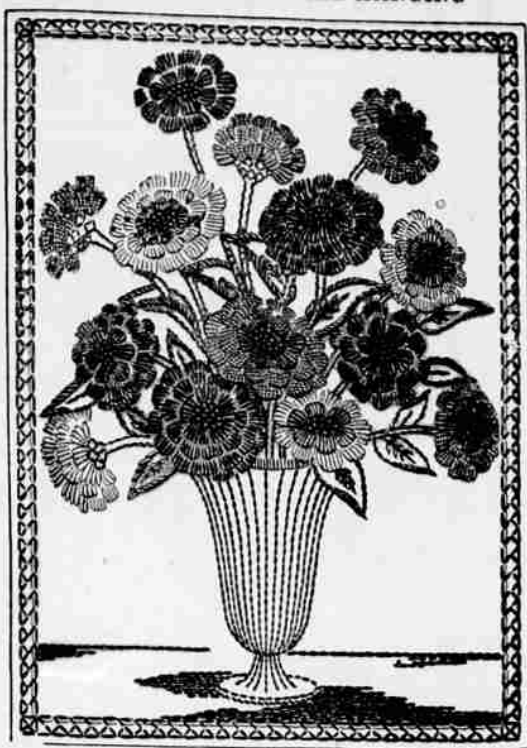

SUMMER SESSION ENROLLMENT UP

Summer session enrollment of the University of Oregon at Eugene will reach 700, a substantial increase over the total of 619 a year ago, it was declared here today by Dr. Dan E. Clark, director for this campus. Registration at noon today totaled 550, compared to 460 at the same time a year ago, he pointed out. Registration material was drawn by at least 150 more students, who did not complete enrollment as yet. Registration will continue the rest of the week.

Grasshopper Poison
To Be Demonstrated
 A demonstration of how to poison grasshoppers when they become obnoxious will be made on the J. W. Wynne farm nine miles west of Junction City, on the high pass road, Wednesday at 4 p. m. It was announced by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

Mr. Fletcher went to Oakridge Tuesday afternoon to obtain a quantity of poison bait used by the government in that section last year. The supply was not used up and the remainder has been kept in storage there since. Mr. Fletcher will take the bait to the Wynne place Wednesday morning and assist in spreading it where the hoppers will likely get hold of it.
