HIGHWAY GROUP TO HEAR TOWN NAME DISPUTE

SALEM, June 25.—(AP)—Following its return from Talent where a hearing was held yesterday an relocation of the Pacific highway through that Jackson city town, the state highway commission will be in Portland tonight to prepare for its two day regular session Friday and Saturday.

Roads on approximately \$1,000,000 highway projects will be opened at the Friday meeting, while on Saturday bids on the state's new short wave radio set-up will be opened. The project calls for 14 permanent stations and ten portable stations. The largest stations would be located at Salem, Klamath Falls and La Grande. Franklin or Smithfield?

The commission will be requested to change the highway designation of the town of Smithfield, near Junction City, to Franklin.

Bids to be opened Friday include: Lane county-Rainbow-Greenleaf creek section of Siuslaw highway, 16.2 miles surfacing; also furnish crushed material in stock pile.

MARTIN WELCOMES SUPERINTENDENTS

SALEM, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Governor Martin welcomed Oregon county school superintendents to their eighth annual conference today with a warning for them to teach their students self-reliance and pride and steer them away from collectivism.

"To build up a great bureaucracy for relief would mean the destruction of our fine civilization," the governor said. "We must not have a beggars' guild in this country."

"It is all right in emergencies to take care of people, but there's no excuse now to continue a program we had in 1933. The emergency is over. We must take care of the incapacitated and the aged, yes, but it ends right there."

"The fellows who are loafing around for handouts must be directed into the berry fields. We must not permit a great economic loss through laziness."

"We got along without this stuff in this country for 150 years. Why go into it now?"

The superintendents applauded the governor's remarks and many told him as they met him personally that they approved his stand on the relief question.

Realty Board Wants Weeds and Grass On Vacant Lots Mowed

The Eugene Realty Board sees the need of cutting the grass and weeds on vacant lots throughout the city. At its regular meeting Tuesday afternoon a resolution on this subject was adopted. The resolution signed by R. A. McCully, president, and Lottie N. Rugh, secretary, reads as follows:

"Whereas, there are a large number of vacant lots in Eugene on which there is a large crop of hay, weeds and, in some places, Canadian thistle, and

"Whereas, these weeds should be cut before they go to seed, and

"Whereas, the hay should be cut before it becomes dry and becomes a fire hazard, and

"Whereas, the prolific quality of our soil is such that the hay and weeds have grown to such a height on vacant corner lots that it has become a serious traffic hazard.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, by the Eugene Realty Board in regular meeting assembled this 24th day of June, 1936, that the Lane county court and city council of Eugene be requested to set the example by having the weeds cut on the lots owned by Lane county and the city of Eugene and that the press be requested to cooperate with publicity in securing cooperation of private owners.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be given to the Eugene Morning News, the Register-Guard, the county court and the city council."

ROTARY PLEDGES LANGUAGE SEARCH

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 25.—(AP)—Delegates to the 27th annual convention of Rotary International today considered a resolution pledging approval and support to the search for an international auxiliary language.

Whether that would be Esperanto, basic English or some other still to be developed, was not specified.

The resolution was presented by the Rotary club of Montclair, N. J., which declared that "the great common problem confronting all nations today cannot be discussed in a common language because there is no one language acceptable to all nationalities. The development of an international auxiliary language is increasingly regarded as an economic necessity."

The Rotary club of Barking, Eng., offered a proposal calling on the international body to redefine "its conception of the service Rotary is able to undertake as an international organization" in view of the "grave and complex" current international problems.

The convention also considered a proposal to hold a Rotary International convention in Tokyo in 1941 or thereabouts. The resolution was offered by the 70th district, comprising Japan, Dairen, Mukden, Harbin and Hankow.

VAN WINKLE SAYS TIME DEDUCTIONS GOOD ON PAROLES

SALEM, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Prisoners serving indeterminate sentences in the state penitentiary are entitled to "good time" deductions from their terms only for the purpose of a parole, Attorney-General Van Winkle ruled today.

Convicts doing definite terms for serious crimes, however, are entitled to the good behavior credits for final release.

No person previously convicted of a crime, though, is eligible for parole or "good time" no matter what type of sentence he is serving, Van Winkle said.

The attorney-general interpreted the parole law at the request of Warden James Lewis of the penitentiary.

Fehl Case Cited

The prison's automatic release system was stopped two months ago when Earl H. Fehl, ex-Jackson county judge, was to have been freed after serving two years and eight months of an indeterminate four-year term for ballot theft. Fehl was required to accept a conditional parole from Governor Martin in order to leave the penitentiary. Fehl now has an injunction proceeding pending in Marion county circuit court to prevent the governor and other officials from enforcing the parole's conditions, which will keep him out of Jackson county for more than a year.

"There is no provision of law authorizing any deductions from the maximum terms of any prisoners who are serving indeterminate sentences, nor from any part of such sentences, except for the purpose of parole," the attorney-general said, further explaining his opinion to the governor two months ago which invalidated the system of giving time off for good behavior and releasing men without paroles.

Entitled to "Good Time"

"All persons convicted of the crimes, committed subsequent to April 17, 1920, (when the legislature adopted an amendment) of homicide in any degree, treason, rape where violence is an element of the crime, robbery of any kind, burglary where armed with a dangerous weapon, and assault with intent to kill while being armed with a dangerous weapon, and sentenced to serve definite terms, are entitled to the good time deductions from their maximum sentences," the opinion continued.

"There is no provision in the statute for parole by the governor either upon his own motion or upon recommendation of the parole board of any person who has previously been convicted of a crime," the attorney-general held.

"It follows that persons sentenced to serve indeterminate sentences... are only eligible to consideration for parole... if they fulfill the requirements...

Methodists Approve Optional Training

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—An initiative petition to make military training optional at state educational institutions won the approval of the Oregon Methodist church conference without a dissenting vote today.

Bishop Titus Lowe asked that action on the measure be postponed until law delegates meet with the pastors in joint sessions but a motion by Lynn Wood, Salem, favoring the vote was carried.

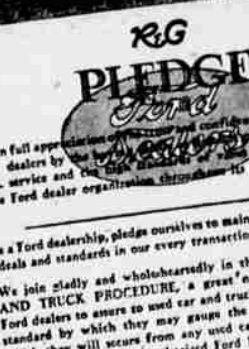
