HOPS BADLY HIT BY MILDEW SPREAD

All hop growing areas in the state

this year have been the worst hit by
the mildew of any season yet, local
growers report. Lane county yards
and those adjacent in Linn county
have suffered to the same extent as
elsewhere in Oregon. Some California
hop sections also have been damaged,
but Washington yards have suffered
but little.

Early fuggles seem to be the only
ones not damaged extensively, grow-
ers state. Early clusters are estimat-
ed to be about 90 per cent and late
clusters, too, are badly affected.

Any definite estimates, however,
are difficult until it is known what
will happen following a few more
sunny days.

The spread of mildew and shortened
crops have had one good effect, of
course, by advancing prices. Hops
quoted around 6 to 9 cents, depending
on quality, now are up to 12 cents.
Considerable hold-over is reported all
along the coast, however, the 1933 and
1934 hops amounting nearly to a full
year's crop along the coast.
