SPECIAL BROADCAST ON FIRE WEATHER IS GIVEN DAILY

Daily broadcast of a special fire weather forecast are being made over KEX radio station in Portland and KOAC station in Corvallis for the benefit of timber owners in Oregon, it is announced by H. J. Cox, secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association.

This forecast consists of the probable humidity and wind conditions by districts. Both Oregon and Washington are divided into districts in order that the forecast may be as localized as possible. KJR station in Seattle will serve the Washington district.

The broadcast over KEX is given at 7:15 p. m. daily; KOAC, 8 p. m.; and KJR at 9:15 p. m.

The following may assist timber owners and others in interpreting these forecasts:
1. An unusually low relative humidity throughout the night or early in the morning is usually indicative of extremely low humidities and a very high inflammability later in the day.

2. Extremely low humidities prevailing for two hours or more will normally result in an extremely high inflammability. The degree of inflammability tends to increase materially with the duration of the low period.

3. High humidities (60 per cent or higher) after a period of two hours or more will result in such a degree of inflammability that there is little danger of fires being started from sparks or making any material spread except insofar as intensely hot fires already burning in heavy slash might carry on, through the drying out of materials adjacent to the fire.

4. The hold-over effect of rains which may have occurred within the last two or three days will naturally tend to reduce the risk and modify the normal effect of low humidities.

5. Unusually low humidities occurring several days in succession or within periods of prolonged drought result in the most extremely dangerous fire conditions.

by spectators will be presented Saturday afternoon. The visitors will carry passengers, and as an added attraction the world-famous motorcycle daredevils, the "Death Dodgers" will offer their program of stunts during the afternoon.

Actual competition for the national awards does not begin until Sunday, when the complete program of events will be run off. Saturday evening, however, a banquet will be held at the Osburn hotel for the visiting pilots, with music by Carl Roosen's dance band. After the banquet, a dance is slated. Eugene dignitaries, including Mayor Elisha Large and others will be honored guests at the banquet.

The entire air meet is under the direction of Yale Smith, national president of the Private Flyers association. All records set will be official, as the P. F. A. is the only national organization of amateur aviators. Committees composed of members of Oregon chapters of the group are co-operating in staging the meet.

Awards for the Sunday competition will be beautiful cast bronze plaques, bearing the P. F. A. shield, and mounted on Oregon woods. They were designed by Art Clough and his Grey Gypsy craftsmen.

Planes will fly over Eugene Saturday noon, as the flyers arrive, dropping handbills advertising the meet, and scattering free airplane rides. Every person finding a slip entitling them to a free ride will be presented with a regulation passenger flight.

Ticket sales for the meet are in the hands of members of the P. F. A., and of the organizations here sponsoring the competition. All money taken in will go to defray expenses of visiting pilots, since the P. F. A. is a non-profit organization interested solely in the advancement of amateur aviation.

The Sunday events will include stunting, races, and many other unusual and thrilling features. The complete program for Sunday, with announcement of competition committees, judges and other details will be carried in the Sunday morning Register-Guard.
