The Eugene First Baptist church is one of the earliest congregations in this part of the valley, having been organized in the early fifties on the old Harlow home north of Eugene in the Willakennie section. Today as one of the larger congregations in this section, it has one of the newest and finest edifices, the church being lo- cated at Broadway and High streets.
Is McPherson Alumnus
Dr. Harms is a graduate of Mc- Pherson college, Kansas. After teach- ing a year in the Peabody high school at Peabody, Kansas, he entered Yale at Peabody, and worked his way through, graduating with a B. D. de- gree in 1921. The following year he was awarded a fellowship in theology at the University of Chicago and grad- uated from that institution with the master of arts degree. After teaching for a while at Tabor college, he en- rolled in the Kansas City Theology seminary and was graduated with magna cum laude. His dissertation on "The Fundamentals of Our Faith," was later published as a textbook for senior B. Y. P. U.'s in the middle west. Following his graduation from col- lege, Dr. Harms was married to Miss Luella Paul, daughter of Judge Paul of McClusky, North Dakota. The Harms family includes three children of high school age and one in the grades.
Has Many Listings
Dr. Harms has been listed by vir- tues of his professional standing and publications in "Who's Who in Amer- ica," "Who's Who in Chicago," "Who's Who in Education," "Who's Who in the Clergy," and "America's Young Men."
For eight years, Dr. Harms occu- pied the chair of Christian education in the Northern Baptist Theological seminary. Two years were spent in evangelistic work with engagements in the central west and Canada. For seven years he has been in pastoral work.
In 1934, Dr. and Mrs. Harms were delegates to the Baptist World Al- liance meeting in Berlin, Germany, and while there Dr. Harms preached sev- eral times on the continent. At the Northern Baptist convention in Color- ado Springs in 1935, Dr. Harms was elected a member of the board of managers of the American Baptist Publication society.
The new pastor is a native of Kan- sas, born June 29, 1894.

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
