## "PRIVATE NUMBER" IS DOUBLED WITH IRVIN COBB SHOW

Long known as the leading American raconteur, Irvin S. Cobb brings his bull-dog face, sub-basement voice and homey wit to the McDonald in a lovable portrayal of a grumpy old man, harsh and unapproachable on the surface, warm-hearted and kindly underneath. In "Everybody's Old Man" he finds a role that fits his natural, home-spun self and makes the most of it.

It has been hinted that the studios have been grooming him to take the place left vacant by Will Rogers, his long-time friend. Irvin Cobb may grow to occupy as large a place in the movie industry as Rogers did, but he will never take Rogers' place for the simple reason that he is the same type of actor that Will was. No more than Rogers can he be anything but himself in any role. If he wins a major position it will be by his own considerable merits, not by aping the characteristics of any one else.

"Everybody's Old Man" is flavored throughout with his salty wit, and though he is supported by Rochelle Hudson, Alan Dinehart and others, it is Cobb's picture from start to finish.

"Private Number" is paired with the Cobb picture. Aside from the romantic interludes furnished by smooth-featured Loretta Young and handsome Robert Taylor, it is distinguished chiefly by a delineation of back-stairs servant intrigue, well handled, and an excellent secondary role portrayal by Basil Rathbone.

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## LEDERER ROMANCE NEXT ON REX BILL

The program arranged for the Rex next week-end includes two pictures, "One Rainy Afternoon" and "The Prisoner of Shark Island." The former is a gay bit of extravagance perpetrated by Francis Lederer. It concerns the hilarious adventures that befall in quick succession when a young man kisses the wrong girl by accident in a moving picture show. Typically Parisian in touch, it is handled with a European lightness that only Lederer, himself a Continental, can give it.

Although film fans will hear his voice for the first time in "One Rainy Afternoon," it was as a singer that Francis first won stage fame. It was in his native Prague that the Czech star began his stage career, first in standard and classical drama and later going into operetta.

In the Rex film he is supported by Ida Lupino, Hugh Herbert and Roland Young. Co-featured with the comedy is Warner Baxter's film picturization of an historic miscarriage of American justice, "The Prisoner of Shark Island." Gloria Stuart plays the vicariously suffering wife of Dr. Mudd, portrayed by Baxter.

## Harold Lloyd Plays Timid Prize-Fighter

Respectable Harold Lloyd, for years prime comedian of the film industry, will appear on the Mayflower screen for one day, Thursday, in his newest vehicle, "The Milky Way."
