

Heilig Has Story of Dancing Master Turned Free Booter on Program

"DANCING PIRATE" HAS TECHNICOLOR, MEXICAN RHYTHM

Filmed in the same brilliant Technicolor that distinguished "La Cucaracha," the Heilig is presenting a new feature, "Dancing Pirate." Starring Charles Collins, Fred Astaire's nimble rival, Frank Morgan in a comedy portrayal and Steffi Duna, it is other favorites, including Luis Alberti, Victor Varconi, Jack La Rue and a score of celebrated Spanish artists. As a musical number production introduces Mexico's great dance craze, Huapango.

Officials assert that the "Dancing Pirate" emerged from six months of intensive, selective reading, during which more than 5,000 musical stories, plays and novels were considered. It is the first feature-length dancing romance ever made with the new improved Technicolor process.

An RKO Radio release, the picture was directed by Lloyd Corrigan and designed in color by Robert Mond Jones, the artist-stage designer who was responsible for the sets in "La Cucaracha." Music and lyrics are by Rogers and Hart, and is scheduled for a four-day run at the Heilig, Sunday to Wednesday.

Quake Is High Point In "San Francisco"

Paired for the first time, Clark Gable and Jeanette MacDonald will give the gaiety and glamour of the Barbary Coast days to the screen when the MacDonald shows "San Francisco" Saturday. Jeanette MacDonald, the queen of the Coast song-and-dance, and Gable has a part that is tailor-made for him as an inveterate and self-assured gambler. Spencer Tracy offers sturdy support to the leading duo. The San Francisco fire (or earthquake) of 1906 is included as the dramatic high-spot of the film.

A trio of the funniest men in movies, Charlie Ruggles, Edward Brophy Horton, and Arthur Treacher, give the gag background for "Hearts Divided." Cosmopolitan production slated for the McDonald Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Jack Powell, cast as Jerome Bonaparte, brother of the Emperor Napoleon, does what Jerome never did in the croons. Marion Davies has the role of Betty Patterson, belle of Baltimore in 1803.

COUNCIL TAKES UP PIN, BALL MACHINE RULING PAST WEEK

OKAIDGE, June 27.—(Special)—The common council for the city of Okaidge met in regular session the past week. Several bills were ordered paid and routine business transacted. A resolution was brought up regarding the licensing of pin and ball machines and other similar machines. It was decided that a tax of \$5 for the first one and \$2.50 for each additional one would be imposed on the owner. The tax is to be paid on July 1 of each year for one year in advance. The council reserves the right to withdraw the ordinance at any time. The resolution was adopted and will be presented in the form of an ordinance at the next regular meeting of the council. At the present time there are six pin and ball machines in the town which will bring in \$20 yearly to the city treasury.
