

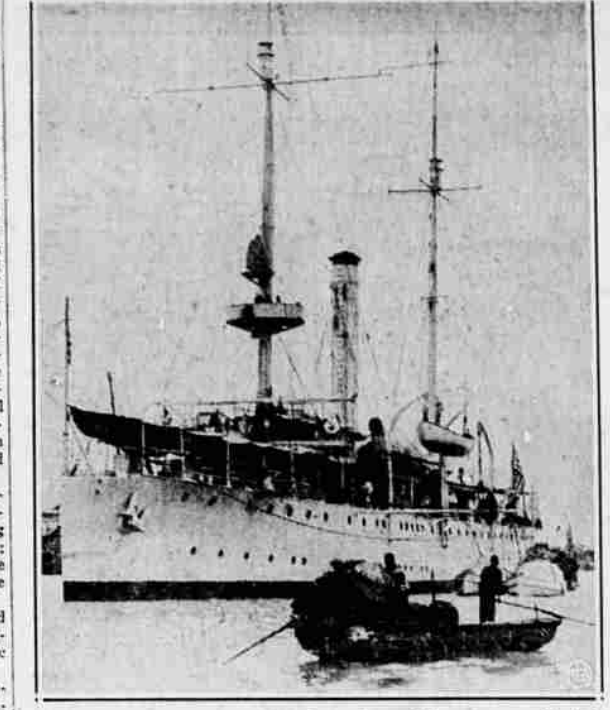

CHANCELLOR HURLS CHALLENGE AT NEA

seems joined for final decisive determination."
Chancellor Hunter pointed out that today there are 185,000 different units of local self-government in the United States. "The weaknesses and the imperfections of the localized system are only too apparent to any who will glance for a moment at the record of municipal government. The multiplicity of the agencies of corruption, the prevalence of graft, the prevalence of organized crime, the breakdowns are all too well known. The many failures of local financial structures, the inadequacy of police control when faced with organized crime under modern conditions, all furnish abundant evidence of the unfulfilled purposes of our local system."
Three fundamental ideas with relation to education were cited by Chancellor Hunter as essential in coping with modern conditions. These were: "First: The spread of knowledge has a creative rescue power for the ills of society."
"Second: Our American origin and the total of our life experience commits us irrevocably to the democratic philosophy of life."
"Third: The methods of science applied to the realm of economics confirm the conception that widespread economic prosperity is to be found in the constant increase of the levels of living and culture of the people."
Lashes at Enemies
Enemies of education, found within the ranks in the form of "extremists among the conservatives," and "leftists, or extreme socialists," as well as those who would wreak havoc by curtailing education's finances, were bitterly scored in the address.
"The extremists among the conservatives charge that education is permeated by radicalism among faculty and student bodies and responsible for impractical and impossible theories of government. The extreme socialists hold that public schools and colleges have developed a breed of materialists and are wholly controlled by the capitalist class."
"The setting in which modern education works is both terrifying and inspiring. But the responsibility which inheres in the calling of the teacher is potent force for the profession en masse and full assurance of the place in the sun for education if we courageously accept the challenge and chart a course marked and guided by science and wisdom."
IOWA OPENS SESSION
PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Miss Agnes Samuelson, state superintendent of public instruction in Iowa and association president, launched the general session and individual assemblies of 18 affiliated groups today in a real Iowa atmosphere.
Miss Samuelson, in her brief address, told the delegates that one of their greatest problems was "to conserve American youth and preserve the close relationship between education and democracy."
Dr. Bruce R. Baxter, president of Willamette university at Salem, stressed the need for character training of children at vespers services Sunday. "Character is caught and not taught," he said.
Academic Freedom Eyed
One of the controversial topics of the convention may be academic freedom.
Many of the educators, particularly from eastern states, are seeking group expression of "interference of politicians and other outside meddlers." Belmont Farley, N. E. A. public relations director, said.
He said the restriction of government theory teaching in Washington, D. C., schools and a questionnaire issued recently by Representative Blanton of Texas were two of the points under fire.
Representative Blanton's questionnaires tabulated the views of teachers on religion, politics, reading material and other subjects.
TEACHERS FREEDOM STRESSED
PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—A committee report declaring "teachers must feel free in their teaching" apparently presaged definite action by the nation's instructors today on proposals to restrict the subjects taught in public schools.
The report, which will be made public at the National Education association convention here, also indicated possible action on a questionnaire inquiring into the political, religious and other beliefs of teachers, with the statement:
"It is futile to expect independent, judicious and courageous minds to be developed in students and pupils by timid and submissive teachers."
The report was issued by Dr. Henry Lester Smith, dean of the school of education at Indiana university and head of the National Education association's committee on academic freedom.
"Teachers are citizens and should be accorded the full rights of all citizens, to express publicly the views they hold and ally themselves with organizations of their own choosing," the report said. It said, however, "teachers should take care not to interfere with the proper discharge of their just educational duties."
Considerable discussion preceded the convention concerning the move to halt the teaching of certain sciences of government in the District of Columbia and the questionnaire offered by Representative Blanton, Texas.

32 CHANGES REPORTED
CORVALLIS, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Announcement of appointments, including 32 changes, and the declaration of Bishop Titus Love that the 84th annual conference of Oregon Methodism was "the most successful in 10 years" brought to a close the 1936 conference of pastors and laymen delegates.
Final business sessions brought passage of resolutions favoring the reorganization of the state's penal system to provide for the segregation of first offenders, reaffirming opposition to war and urging that military training be made voluntary. Action on the military training question, however, did not constitute an endorsement of the initiative petitions now in circulation in Oregon but was taken as a recommendation of national policy. The proposal to urge that Blaine Kirkpatrick, formerly of Eugene, and Owen Geer, national Epworth League representative, be retained until young people have a chance to vote was tabled. The two have been under fire for so-called left-wing teaching. The suggestion that the transfer of young prisoners from the state prison to the training school be condemned was tabled in favor of the more general resolution for first offenders.

SOLDIER WHO SNUBBED A KING
PRINCE FRANCOIS EUGENE of Savoy was being groomed for the Church, some three centuries ago, when one day he went to King Louis XIV. of France, and asked to join the army. The king refused because, it is said, Eugene's mother was in disgrace at court. So the prince went to Austria, where Leopold I gave him his opportunity.
In Austria, Prince Eugene acquitted himself heroically, so much so that, in 1691, Louis XIV heard of his deeds and offered him a marshal's baton. Coldly, and promptly, Prince Eugene refused the honor. He allied himself with the great Duke of Marlborough, and helped win the famous battles of Blenheim, Oudenarde, and Malplaquet. But, victorious in war, Eugene was a failure with women. He remained a bachelor, and when he interceded for Marlborough, who had been dismissed in disgrace, Queen Anne refused to hear him.
He died in 1736 at the age of 73. His portrait appears on one of Austria's recent issue of stamps honoring her heroes.
