LOCAL PEACHES COMING IN NOW; CABBAGE LOWER

Wheat was down a cent a bushel in Eugene Monday, the Eugene Mill and Elevator company offering 82 cents for both red and white varieties. Eggs, butter, poultry, cheese, wool and mohair were steady.

In the vegetable line cabbage dropped a cent a pound, buyers offering 2 1/2 cents.

Local peaches are coming in and grocers are being paid 20 cents a basket for them.

CHRYSLER JUMPS TO NEW 6-YEAR TOP ON MONDAY

NEW YORK, June 29. — (AP) — Heaviness of steels put a damper on a stock market rally today which was inaugurated by Chrysler with a jump to a new 6-year top.

Late profit taking showed up in most departments, although the motor leader and several specialties held gains of fractions to around 2 points. The close was irregular. Transfers approximated 800,000 shares.

Abnormally high temperatures prevalent over the corn belt with death of moisture provided active incentive to purchase corn. Final transactions in corn were at the day's topmost level.

PORTLAND, June 29. — (AP) — Butter, butterfat steady, unchanged. Eggs unchanged.

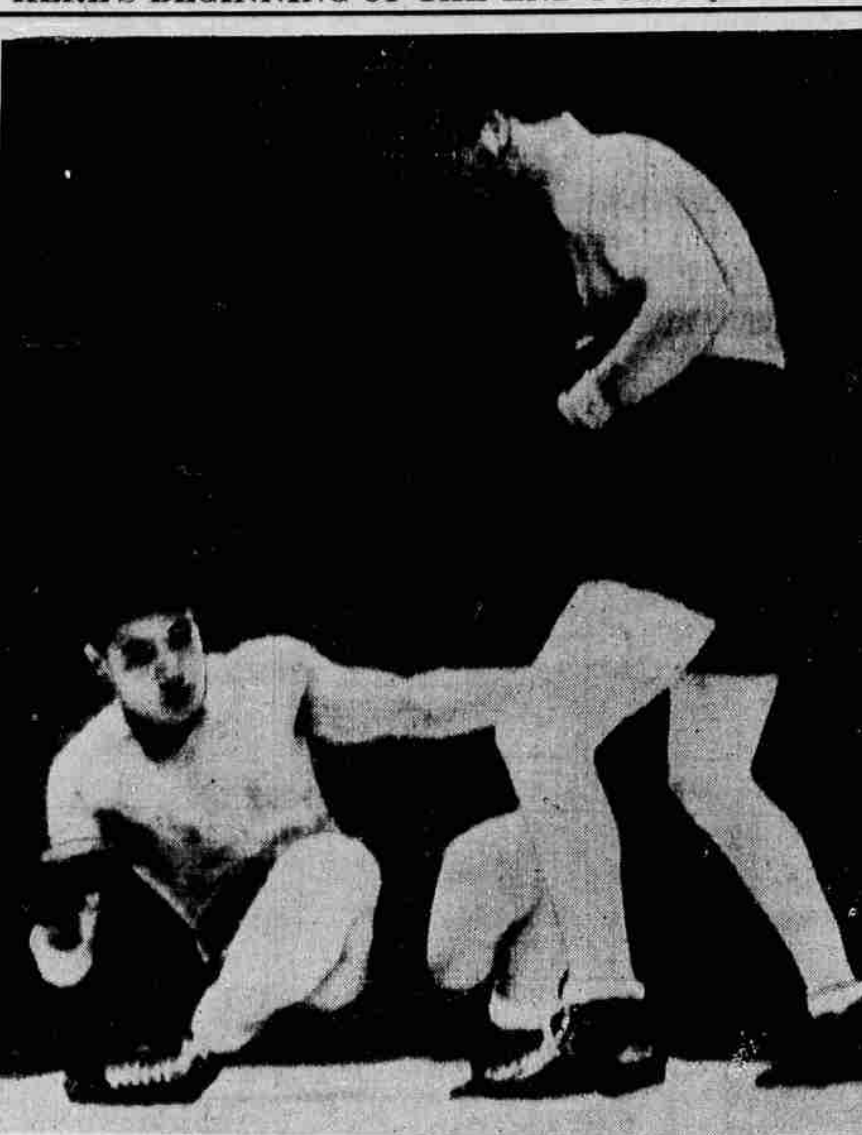
Little relief seemed imminent from local high prices on all potatoes. Prospects for Oregon apricots appeared discouraging with reports indicating crops 50 per cent below last year. Country meats were steady with unchanged prices.

On the east side farmers' market strawberries, nearing their final appearance, ranged from \$1.75-2.10 crate. Raspberries held fairly firm, with prices ranging from \$1.35-1.60. Youngberries held firm and brought prices from \$1.40-1.60. Currants pushed up from 90c late last week to \$1.10 and \$1.15 today. Bing and Royal Ann cherries brought a price of 8c generally. Pie cherries sold at 3 1/2c. Loganberries weak at 80c-1.10. Cabbage \$1.25 a crate. New potatoes continued scraping ceilings, bringing \$2.25 per orange box. Blackberries brought \$1.25-1.35 per crate.
