

NAVAJOS RESPOND TO MEDICINE MEN IN RAIN CEREMONY

GANADO, Ariz., July 1.—(Special)—Responding to the powerful rain ceremony—Navajodolins—long-haired Navajo braves from hinterlands of the Black Mesa grouped about cedar fires in chilly desert dawn today near the hacienda of Don Lorenzo Hubbell.

There they awaited messengers sent to four sacred mountains for the holy water over which three days of primitive tribal prayers for rain will be chanted. These mountains, hundreds of miles apart, are the legendary corners for the vast domain the gods, in the tribesmen's legends, meant to be Navajo-land.

Departure of the messengers, originally set for Saturday, was delayed until yesterday for completion of the ceremonial hogan.

Hubbell Heads Group

Heading one group is Roman Hubbell, son of Don Lorenzo who founded this remote trading post and called it Ganado for the flocks that graze in the fertile wash. Here the late Theodore Roosevelt and other celebrities have been guests.

With Hubbell is Beninle, renowned medicine man who issued the call for the ceremony after some of the Navajo stockmen brought tales of parching rangeland.

They are at Taos, 200 miles east of here, where from the top of Pajarito peak they will fill a wicker jar with mountain water.

Other groups climbed tortuous paths on the sides of rugged Pajarito peak, 100 miles north to the San Francisco peaks in Arizona, 100 miles westward, and Mount Taylor in southern New Mexico.

To Get Final Jar

From Mount Taylor, lofty marker of the tribal domain on the south, Hubbell and his party will obtain the final jar of water on their return from Pelado. The 16-mile ascent must be climbed without a backward glance.

Before departure, members of each group washed in amole (soap plant) soapuds. Each was given clean Navajo clothing. Each party bears sacred poles and the members must continue pure in thought to assure success of the ritual.

"I will believe in the ceremony forever," Hubbell said. "Group prayer— all in one mind, supplicating to the holy spirit as they know it, with pure thought—will bring rain and cure disease. The Indians have demonstrated that this will work."
