Mrs. Ren Snyder and two daughters, Beverly and Suzanne of Corvallis, are visiting with friends in Coburg.

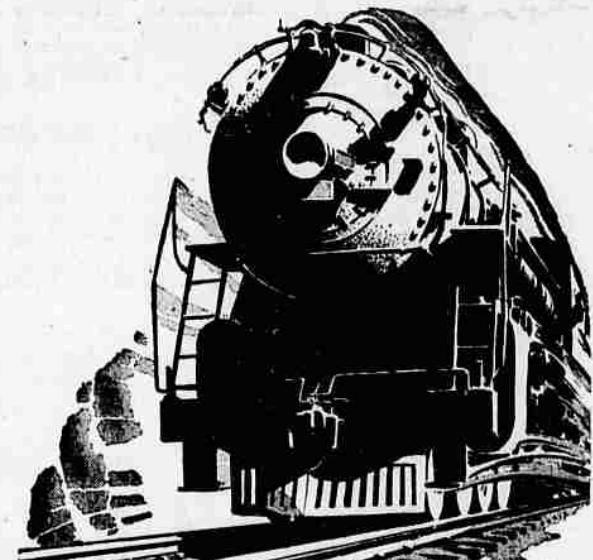
