

VALUE OF TIMBER RESOURCES SHOWN BY ACTIVE SPEAKER

Residents of the state of Oregon must recognize the possibility of depletion of timber resources unless proper conservation methods are put into general practice, it was declared by Roy Elliott, assistant supervisor of the Willamette national forest, in a talk before the Eugene Active club Thursday noon.

Urging citizens to give consideration to the danger of losing the timber resources which guarantee unannounced water supply sources, furnish industry for thousands of persons and provide recreational facilities of untold value, Mr. Elliott stressed the value of sustained yield operations in forests to assure perpetuation of this great resource.

Speaking on the topic, "Your Forests and Mine," Mr. Elliott outlined the value of timber resources by pointing to the industry, good water, recreation, power and other items that may be traced directly to the forests and which are of almost unlimited value to the state.

Timber "Green Gold."
"Timber is the green gold of our country," he said, "but unlike other gold, it stands out, reaching toward the heavens, for everyone to see, enjoy and receive value from. One-fourth the standing timber of the United States is found in Oregon and Lane and Douglas counties have the largest amount of commercial timber of any other counties."

"Within the boundaries of the Willamette national forest there is more standing commercial timber than in any other national forest in the country. It is estimated at forty billion board feet with an estimated value of eighty million dollars. There is enough lumber in this stand to build four and one-half million homes to house twenty million persons."

"Our timber stand can act as a stabilizing element in a community, furnishing industry and employment for many citizens, but with the danger of depletion of this resource ever present, the thinking citizen must be prepared to advocate and support measures to prevent depletion."

Sustained Yield Needed
The sustained yield principle, whereby timber is cut in such a manner as to leave seed trees so that by the time one growth is depleted, the next growth will be ready for harvesting, is the accepted plan of preserving this resource, the speaker said.

The value of timber in preventing floods and serious erosion was stressed by Mr. Elliott who declared that standing timber was the only sound way of regulating stream flow.

The recreational value of forest lands was pointed out by the speaker who quoted figures showing that in 1934 tourists brought into the state an estimated \$19,000,000 which increased to \$20,000,000 in 1935.

"These great values can be renewed and perpetuated by intelligent conservation programs," he concluded.

FORMER ADVISER RAPS ROOSEVELT POLICY ON TRADE

CHICAGO, July 2.—(AP)—George N. Peek, former special adviser to President Roosevelt on foreign trade, charged today that the administration's policies had opened "the United States and the Americas to economic and perhaps political colonization by other nations."

He declared, in an address prepared for delivery before the Agricultural club:

"The trade agreements program is breaking down the American market for American agriculture and industry and by contributing to the prolongation of the farm crisis is undermining the whole basis of recovery."

Peek accused Secretary of State Hull of attacking "the independence of the American economic system" in pursuit of a low tariff policy.

"In their zeal to reduce tariffs generally," he said, "they extended all our concessions to all nations (except Germany), including nations in default on public and private debts, nations whose exchange restrictions were crippling our trade, nations which had negotiated special agreements from which we were excluded, in fact to all nations whether or not they offered us reciprocal treatment of any kind in return."

"This was not reciprocity, nor was it bargaining in any real sense—it was general tariff reduction with a fancy name and with fancy trimmings."

Worse Than '30 and '34
The weather bureau said rain was needed more throughout the farm area than it was on the corresponding dates in 1930 and 1934—the years in which the United States suffered from its two worst droughts of the century.

As a result of this report, wheat prices shot upward on leading domestic grain exchanges. Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, however, said he believed retail food prices would not be affected immediately.

Bread prices, he said, probably would not rise above the level of recent years. Meat prices probably will not reflect drought conditions for at least nine months.

WPA officials rushed plans to put 25,000 farmers—whose spring wheat crops have been nearly wiped out—to work immediately on emergency projects, and an additional 15,000 farmers within a week.

WPA Administrator Harry L. Hopkins said workers would be paid the usual wage scales for relief work, which, he said, was slightly more than \$40 per month.

AAA officials, attempting to relieve farmers who might be hesitant to plant additional feed crops for fear of losing their soil conservation benefits, announced modifications of the program for the south and east central regions permitting planting of extra feed crops without reduction of benefits.

The modifications, the AAA said, would enable farmers to bring feed supplies up to normal though it might involve use of a greater soil depleting acreage than normally would be approved. Officials said similar modifications were being considered for other drought-stricken areas.

TEXAS FLOOD TOLL REACHES 22 DEATHS
DALLAS, Tex., July 2.—(AP)—The bodies of an adult and two children were taken from raging flood waters at Kyle early today, bringing the death toll from a series of cloudbursts that devastated parts of south Texas, to at least 22. Authorities feared the rapidly receding waters would reveal more bodies.

Today, 24 hours after spouts of water poured from the skies, the full story of the disaster was coming from the isolated regions. Soon after the cloudbursts, dry stream beds contained maddened torrents that swept everything before them. Hundreds of thousands of acres of farmlands were inundated as were several towns. Property damage was estimated in the millions.

The cloudbursts struck in Gonzales and adjoining counties in south Texas. Today the flood waters were receding as rapidly as they rose, revealing a more grave picture than had been anticipated. The flood ripped through the settlement of Kyle, between Austin and San Antonio, where three bodies were found today. Business buildings and streets in Gonzales were at one time under three to five feet of water. A number of frame houses were washed down the river.
