

IRVING CUSTER NAMED TO Y. M. STAFF IN CITY

Irving D. Custer, former director of physical education at the Eugene Y. M. C. A., has been selected as assistant to W. P. Walter, general secretary at the Y. It was announced Friday by G. A. Harnden, president of the Eugene Y. M. C. A. board of directors.

"Mr. Custer was selected from several applicants for the position because of our confidence in him and because of his splendid record while on the staff of the local Y a few years ago," Mr. Harnden stated. "He is well known in Eugene, is highly respected as a citizen and as a Y worker, and is in full sympathy and accord with our present policy and plan in attempting to meet the needs of the boys and young men of Eugene." Mr. Harnden further stated.

Besides serving the local association as physical director for 1928 and 1929, Mr. Custer was secretary of the Wendling Y. M. C. A. for two years, was on the staff of the Portland association for two years and in 1917 was the acting general secretary of the Eugene association for a short time. He is a graduate of Springfield Y. M. C. A. college and of the Seaback Y. M. C. A. summer school. He has taken graduate work at the University of Oregon and will enter the university this fall to study for his master's degree, attending classes in the morning. He holds an A.B. degree, also a bachelor's degree in physical education. For the past four years, Mr. Custer has been teaching in the high school at Seaside, Oregon. He will take up his official duties at the local Y on September 1.

Besides being in charge of all physical educational work at the local Y, Mr. Custer will assist Mr. Walter in a program of activities for boys and young men. "Personally, I feel that the board of directors made an excellent choice in Mr. Custer," Secretary Walter stated. "I have been associated with him in many activities in connection with Y. M. C. A. work, and certainly am delighted over the prospect of having him as a fellow worker in the Y here."

Stories in STAMPS



ITALY'S first official announcement to the world that Ethiopia now is Italian is by means of a set of new stamps, marking Haile Selassie's fallen kingdom as an Italian colony.

The stamps bear a portrait of Emperor Victor Emmanuel and carry the date of May 9, 1936, when Addis Ababa was occupied by Mussolini's troops. The name of Ethiopia appears in both Roman and Amharic lettering. There are three values.

Cover collectors no longer will receive co-operation of postal officials in Great Britain and its colonies, due to a recent ruling from London that no postmaster cancel stamps on envelopes mailed to him for return to the sender. Of course, covers for collections may be sent through British and colonial postoffices with the aid of official agencies in the various colonies. But that will be quite a difficult undertaking and so first day and other commemorative covers from these places will be rare and valuable.

Canada, and other self-governing territories, will continue to co-operate with collectors.

There are rumors that the U. S. Postoffice Department is planning to print more of the commemorative stamps, including the sheet of four designed for the recent stamp exhibition, to take care of continuing demands for these stamps. If so, the stamps may be worth not much more than their face value. (Copyright, 1936, NEA Service, Inc.)

JOURNALIST SHOOTSELF

GENEVA, July 3.—(4P)—Shouting, "It is the last blow; this is the death of the league of nations," Stefan Lux, Czechoslovak journalist-photographer, shot himself in the assembly hall today while delegates were burying the Italo-Ethiopian dispute.

Found in Lux's pockets were letters to King Edward VIII, British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, the Manchester (Eng.) Guardian and Joseph A. C. Avenol, league secretary general.

He shouted Avenol's name as he was carried to hospital, a severe wound in his chest.

"I did it as a gesture," he sobbed. Lux has been in poor health, which may have been a factor in causing him to shoot himself.

Rail Freight Shows Business Increase

WASHINGTON, July 3.—(4P)—Loading of revenue freight for the week ended June 27, totaled 715,639 cars, the Association of American Railroads announced today.

Asked if the government would establish such a system, he replied:

"No. I simply suggested it as a possible method of crop insurance. The government could do it."

MILLION BUSHELS LOST

CHICAGO, July 3.—(4P)—Drought in the northwest cost farmers 100,000,000 bushels of wheat in June, private crop experts reported today.

Chicago's five famed private grain statisticians in their report on wheat conditions at the first of July estimated the spring wheat yield this year would total 134,000,000 bushels, 102,000,000 bushels less than predicted a month ago.

MINE BIBLIOGRAPHY NEARS COMPLETION

PORTLAND, Ore., July 3.—(Special)—A complete bibliography, that will include every available reference to Oregon's underground resources, will soon be completed by Ray C. Treasore, research expert for the Oregon state planning board, and Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, professor of geology at Oregon State college. It was announced here today by Ormond R. Bean, chairman of the board.

Every item included in the bibliography will not only be indexed, with exact information on where it may be obtained, but will be digested as well. This will enable the reader to determine whether or not the reference is worthy of further study, it is pointed out. The index will be thoroughly cross-referenced, so that particular digests may be readily picked out. A special effort is made to note all locally references.

The bibliography is expected to be invaluable to mining engineers who take examinations, to mining owners, to investors who wish authentic information, and to professional geologists. Amateur geologists will find it a necessary handbook, especially when information on localities is sought. It will be an important addition to knowledge of resources of the state for the general public, board experts point out.

The volume will be released in a limited edition and all orders must be placed prior to publication. Information on obtaining copies may be found at the office of the state planning board, 811 Spaulding building, Portland.
