BROWN AND SPINA RATED EVEN FOR STADIUM BATTLE

Buzz Brown and Al Spina—principals in the Northwest featherweight championship bout to be staged at Multnomah stadium, Portland, next Monday—are nearing the peak of condition for their impending grudge brawl.
This match, closed after several months of bickering, rates as one of the hottest local wars ever signed for Portland.
Spina, sensational little 124-pound brawler, waded through a flock of California opposition during the winter and spring—defeating such stars as Speedy Dado, Young Tommy, Tuffy Pierpont, Frankie Castillo, Baby Face Matheson and others. Right now he is regarded as the most promising young featherweight on the Pacific Coast.
Brown, a bit older than Spina, and a classier fighter in every respect, has dogged the Italian's trail ever since he hit the top flight.
The Buzzer will be in the best shape of his long career and began the grind with long outdoor sessions. He is browned and lean.
Spina's training under the direction of Manager Ace Baker has been along different lines. Al has been a most successful fighter training indoors, so his schedule has not been changed.

Mass Purchase Of Feed Economy For State Game Group

PORTLAND, Ore., July 4.—(AP)—The state game commission will be able to save more than \$10,000 through mass purchases of feed with the completion within the next few weeks of eight 10-ton ice plants for storage purposes, Matt L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries, said today.
The feed is used in propagating fish. The plants are located at Hood River, Fall River, Klamath, Rock Creek, Roaring River, Bandon, Alsea and Necanicum.

RESCUE WORK IN FLOOD AREA RUSHED

VICTORIA, Tex., July 4.—(AP)—Rescue parties hurried through the Guadalupe flood area today, clearing marooned refugees in a race against the rain-glutted river, rolling its menacing flood toward the gulf.
The death list stood at 25 as high water spread for miles over the low-lying coastal plain, piling up inestimable crop damage. The flood crest, definitely past important farming towns, moved onward to San Antonio bay.
It was estimated that \$100,000 damage had been done to homes there and the crop loss would amount to another \$1,000,000. The Red Cross unit here was feeding and sheltering more than 500 refugees.

Davis Cup Choices Named For England

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 4.—(AP)—The British Davis Cup selection committee today named Fred Perry, H. W. (Bunny) Austin, Pat Hughes and Charles R. D. Tucker to defend the cup in the challenge round late this month.
Fred Perry, who retained his men's singles title yesterday, paired with Dorothy Round, England's No. 1 woman player, to beat Frank Wilde and Mary Whitmarsh, also of England, 6-4, 1-6, 6-3, in a mixed doubles semi-final match.
Perry and Miss Round, English school teacher, defeated Donald Budge of California and Mrs. Fabry in the finals, 7-9, 7-5, 6-4.

Alaska Warms Up; Juneau Plans Meet

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 4.—(AP)—It was so warm in southeastern Alaska Friday the citizens decided to conduct over the holiday period the first swimming meet ever held in the capital city.
Scores of entrants were received for race and diving contests which will take place in nearby Gastineau channel, only a few miles from the big Columbia glacier.
The temperature hovered around the middle seventies.

Seven Injured In Crash Near Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash., July 4.—(AP)—One of seven persons injured early today in a terrific head-on automobile collision 20 miles north of here was reported in a critical condition tonight. Attendees said John Edwards, 45, Priest River, Idaho, was suffering from a serious basal skull fracture. He was driving one of the cars. John Merriek, 27, Spokane, driver of the other car, and Nick Stoban, 35, Priest River, were believed out of danger. They were unconscious for several hours after the crash. None of the others was hurt critically.

PRIZE MAY BE SHOT AT SOUTHERN TITLE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 4.—(AP)—A "shot" at either Baby Ariamendi or Henry Armstrong, who fight in Los Angeles July 12 for the featherweight title of California, may be the prize for the winner of the Al Spina-Buzz Brown fight here Monday night.
Matchmaker Stub Nelson said he might bring the winner of the Los Angeles bout here later this summer for an open air shot at Multnomah Stadium against the winner of the fight for the unofficial Oregon featherweight title.
The two Portland fighters will take their final stiff workouts tomorrow afternoon at the Labor Temple.
Manager Ace Baker then will move Spina into a quiet hotel near the stadium for uninterrupted rest 48 hours previous to the battle.
Tex Salkeld, portly manager of Brown, said his fighter was down to 125½ pounds Friday and would have no trouble making 126 pounds ringside for the battle.

ARMY BAG BURNS AFTER SMASH-UP

DENVER, July 4.—(AP)—Major William Hood, operations officer in charge of the national balloon race, said he was informed the United States Army entry had been destroyed by fire near Elizabeth, Colo., 35 miles south of Denver. The pilot, Capt. Haynie McCormick and his aid, Lieut. John A. Tarro, escaped uninjured. Hood said he was notified.
The operations officer said he was informed the army balloon had encountered a small fire and was forced to land. He said he was unable to learn the cause of the fire which destroyed the bag.
An army truck was dispatched to Elizabeth to return the two-man crew and the balloon's wreckage to Denver.
Earlier today a balloon had been sighted about 24 miles east of Denver, drifting in the direction of Elizabeth. A farmer near Watkins, east of Denver, had informed race officers that it was the Cleveland-Great Lakes entry. Hood said the identification might have been a mistake and that the balloon seen may have been the army craft.
LITTLE BOY DROWNS
WENATCHEE, July 4.—(AP)—Tragedy stalked North Central Washington's observance of Independence day when Leonard Wachholz, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Wachholz, 707 Emerson street, lost his life by drowning in the Icicle river near Leavenworth. Seagram, millionaire distiller of Toronto, Ont., triumphing in a surprise victory before 45,000 spectators at Arlington Park.
