

'Soak The Rich' At Heilig, 'San Francisco' At McDonald Top Programs

ABLE, MACDONALD PAIRED IN PICTURE OF BARBARY COAST

"San Francisco" brings Clark Gable and Jeanette MacDonald together as a co-starring team for the first time.

The musical romance gives Miss MacDonald her widest scope in vocal numbers in her screen career—a total nine presentations ranging from a hymn to the most beautiful dramatic aria.

Clark Gable returns to the vigorous role that first elevated him to stardom as a blustering Barbary Coast sailing captain who has no faith in anything but his own power and charm.

Co-starring with Miss MacDonald is Gable's Spencer Tracy in his unusual role, that of a priest; supporting cast includes Jack Holt and Ted Healy.

"San Francisco" is laid in the colorful period of 1905-06, its life of city and song, its Barbary Coast flavor and through the disaster that befell the famous Golden Gate city forty years ago.

On the same program, which will run at the McDonald until Tuesday, "The Law in Her Hands," dramatic story of a clever female lawyer who is the "month-piece" for a range of criminals. Margaret Lindsay has the role, supported by Glenda Farrell and Lyle Talbot.

"Tango" is a name of a shade of hosiery, and the story is built around the adventures of the advertising model who wears it.

Marshall Not Dapper In "Forgotten Faces"

Herbert Marshall, long known as the best-dressed man in the movies, appears in prison garb and a dapper uniform in "Forgotten Faces," melodrama slated for the Rex Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Marshall plays convict who comes butler in his daughter's life in order to frustrate his former wife's attempt to blackmail their son. Gertrude Michael plays the young wife.

With title lifted from the Reader's Digest's famous article, "And Sudden Death," co-billed with "Forgotten Faces," is fast-moving melodrama of thrills, chills and smash-ups. Featured players are Randolph Scott, Frances Drake and Tom Brown.

Good Outdoor Shots Spot Equine Drama

Rated as one of the top productions in animal pictures, "Stormy," slated for the State on a double program with "The Lawless Nineties" Thursday-to-Saturday, has some superb scenes of wild-horse stampedes and beautiful shots of range country. The large cast features Noah Beery, Jr., Jean Rogers, Fred Kohler, J. Farrell MacDonnell, and Raymond Hatton.

In the other picture John Wayne rides again as a Western G-Man, plunging into trouble and out again with his usual abandon.

Field's Super-Nose Is Seen In "Poppy"

The bulbous nose and irascible voice of W. C. Fields will be seen and heard at the McDonald in a tinsel-spangled story of 1883 carnival days, starting Saturday, "Poppy" is the star's 22nd film since his first appearance in the movies. His first, in silent days, was "Sally of the Sawdust" in which he made an immediate hit in the same role he plays in "Poppy."

Fields plays the part of Professor Eustace McGargle, "med man," and runs a small shell game on the side. The leading supporting roles are taken by Rochelle Hudson and Richard Cromwell.

HECHT, MACARTHUR IN 'SOAK THE RICH'

Nothing has ever been sacred to Ben Hecht and Charlie MacArthur, that rowdy unconventional pair of authors, playwright, producers and actors, and "Soak the Rich," flickering at the Heilig Sunday-to-Wednesday proves it. Moss-covered institutions and sacred cows fall in droves before the onslaught of their cutting wit.

Walter Connolly appears as an irascible millionaire who is afraid he

is going to get dunked when revolting undergraduates attempt to "Soak the Rich." John Howard is the young student leader who brings near-apoplexy to Connolly, and Mary Taylor plays the millionaire's daughter, also a prominent figure in the student revolt against her father.

Hecht and MacArthur, who have taken bit parts in their former productions, "Crime Without Passion" and "The Scoundrel," cast themselves as two heavy-footed G-men in the current film. Lionel Stander, frolicsome comedian so successful in "The Scoundrel" and "Mr. Deeds Goes to Town" has a juicy part in the opus as well.

The voices of Jan Kiepura and Gladys Swarthout are blended in "Give Us This Night" which will complete the program for the Heilig.
