

Basement Ball Clubs Have Field Day Against Top-Flight Big League Teams

NATIONALS HASH LEAGUE STANDINGS IN SUNDAY GAMES

NEW YORK, July 6.—(AP)—Every team in the National league first division swapped places yesterday. The St. Louis Cardinals traded places with the Chicago Cubs, climbing from second to first and the Pittsburgh Pirates took over third from Cincinnati Reds who were reduced to fourth.

Coming from behind, the Cards scored four runs in the ninth to send the Reds to defeat, 8 to 6, in the first game, but the nightcap was a walk away, 17 to 7. The Cubs, meantime, took a 4 to 2 beating from the Pirates.

Brooklyn won its first game in six starts, 4 to 2, from the Giants. The Philadelphia Phillies increased their winning streak to five games with a 7 to 6 decision over the Boston Bees.

Jimmy Doherty turned his former New York Yankee mates back with eight hits as Washington battered out a 9 to 3 win which trimmed a full game from the Yanke's substantial American league lead.

Detroit's world champion Tigers won their 13th game out of 15 starts by overwhelming the St. Louis Browns 18 to 9.

The Boston Red Sox, virtually decked with the Tigers, walloped the Philadelphia Athletics twice, 16 to 2 and 8 to 2.

Cleveland and Chicago split a twin bill, the Indians taking the first, 11 to 4, and the White Sox winning the nightcap, 4 to 2.

NEW YORK, July 6.—(AP)—With the athletic decks cleared for decisive action, it's possible today to offer a fairly accurate line on who's who and what's likely to happen in the final Olympic track and field trials Saturday and Sunday at the new Randall's Island stadium.

So closely matched are the contestants and so packed with dynamite are the possibilities in at least six events, however, that few observers or coaches feel confident they can forecast the outcome.

This applies especially to the 400, 300 and 1500-meter runs, the 110-meter high hurdles, the running high jump, and the pole vault, in all of which world record smashers will swing into action against formidable rivals.

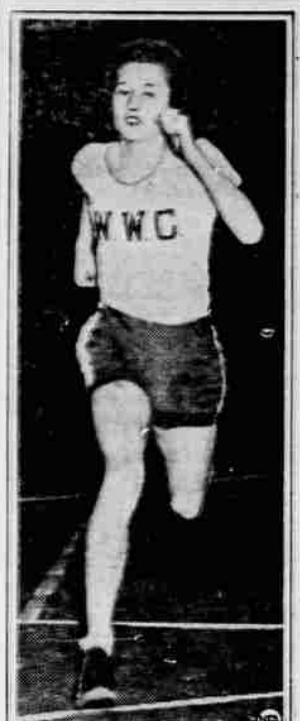

HUSKY BOAT CREW TAKES U. S. TITLE. BID TO OLYMPICS

PRINCETON, N. J., July 6.—(AP)—A powerful University of Washington crew came from last place at the half-year mark in the Olympic tryout finals yesterday to win the United States' title and the right to defend a 10-year record in the 2,000-meter boat race in Berlin next month.

The Huskies stepped up a terrific pace on Lake Carnegie yesterday to pull their slim boat past the pick of the nation's oarsmen and finish only a second and three-fifths short of the world record.

Washington finished more than a length ahead of the half-exhausted Pennsylvania crew in 6 minutes, 44.5 seconds—just short of the 6:03 1-5 made by California in winning the world's title at Amsterdam in 1928. California, striving to represent the United States in the Olympics for the third straight time, finished third, a half-length behind Penn. New York A. C. came in fourth, 2 1/2 lengths behind California.

Washington was fresh at the finish, a magnificent boatload of superbly conditioned athletes. Penn was rowed out, with the No. 4 and No. 5 men exhausted. California was fresher than Penn.

"The boys I rowed with in 1928 may call it treason," said Al Ulrickson, who stroked Washington's crew in 1928 crew, "but I believe this crew is the greatest outfit that ever rowed for Washington. They don't know what defeat is and I feel sorry for any crew that thinks it can lick 'em."

FOURTEEN FEET HIT ONLY A MONTH AGO

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—(AP)—George Varoff, University of Oregon freshman, who broke the world's pole vault record at the National A. A. U. championships in Princeton on the Fourth of July, cleared 14 feet for the first time only a month ago.

The amazing feat of the young Russian, who went over the bar at 14 feet 6 1/2 inches, more than an inch above the previous record, was further emphasized by the fact that he never would have had his chance but for three friends who were convinced he could do it.

They were Ben Eastman, world's record holder at 440 and 880 yards, Charles Hunter, coach of the San Francisco Olympic Club team, which Varoff represented, and a Stanford shotputter whose identity was not disclosed. They put up their money to bet George could.

About a week before the Princeton meet, Varoff cleared 14 feet 3 inches in the semi-final Olympic trials at Los Angeles, the first time he ever made that height.

The 22-year-old youth was born in Hawaii. His father worked for a San Francisco window washing concern until he was hurt eight months ago.

GREAT GOLF By ART KRENZ



MANY golf instructors err when they inform their pupils that there is little difference between the strokes for the wood and that for the iron. What they probably mean is that the basic fundamentals are the same.

The iron swing is a more vertical stroke than the wood. The iron is shorter, necessitating a stance closer to the ball. Then there is a difference in the position the ball is played. For the wood, it is off the left heel or instep, moving back toward the right foot for the shorter woods and further still for the iron.

Since the iron is a stroke in which a limited amount of distance is desired, the backswing is shortened. In the wood shot the club is taken to the limit of the backswing, with over-swinging being guarded against.

PORTLAND, July 6.—(AP)—An old argument in the northwest flared circles will take the shortest way to an answer tonight when Al Spina and Buzz Brown met in a featherweight bout over the 10-round quota.

Spina, flashy Portland boxer who has cut a spectacular path through the flint ranks of the featherweights in recent months, defeating such top-notchers as Speedy Dado, Young Tommy, Frankie Castillo and Tuffy Pierpont, will go into the ring the underdog.

The boys who risk their money on such things are betting 3 to 2 that Brown, Minneapolis product, comes out with the fame, although large amounts of Spina money made even money possible by ring time.

Brown was given the edge in early betting because of his experience, with Spina supporters counting on the young Italian's punch.

Each must scale 125 pounds or forfeit 25 per cent. of the purse.

COACHING STAFF COMPLETE AT OSC

CORVALLIS, July 6.—(AP)—Oregon State college called back one of its greatest athletic heroes, Howard Maple, to take over freshman sports next year.

Just to make the combination a stellar one so far as athletic fame is concerned, the new intercollegiate athletic board appointed Wally Palmberg, Oregon's basketball star for the past three years, Maple's assistant.

Maple will assist with spring football practice, leaving most of the training of future basketball talent to Palmberg.

It was seven years ago that Maple left school after a career in which he won all-star fame in football and baseball, playing quarterback and catcher. He played on two grid teams which defeated Oregon and was a star in the upset victory over New York University in 1928.

Maple left school to play professional football and baseball, getting major league tryouts with the Chicago White Sox. For the past few years he has been assistant coach at Willamette University.

Palmberg topped off a brilliant basketball career by winning an All-American berth last season.

The appointments completed the revision of the Orangemen's athletic forces with Carl Lodell as director and athletic manager, George Scott, assistant, Lon Stiner, Jim Dixon and Hal Moe, varsity football coaches, Slats Gill, basketball, Grant Swan, varsity and freshman track, Ralph Coleman, golf, Jack Hewitt, swimming, and Dr. R. T. Simms, tennis.

California took three out of the four favored places in the women's singles, with Golda Myer Goss, champion of 1935, seeded first. Hazel Schenk, Portland city champion, was seeded fourth.

Another Californian, Frank Kovacs, was seeded first in the junior singles and Darrell Kelly, Portland, second.

U. S. National Has Notable Increase In Deposits, Loans

The United States National bank, which has a direct branch in Eugene, reports a continuation of its phenomenal growth, according to official statement issued to the controller of currency as of June 30th. Deposits now stand at \$108,258,505.83 and total resources—\$114,603,329.74, marking a growth in deposits of over ten and a half millions and a growth in resources of over twelve millions in the past twelve months, approximately its former gains of almost a million dollars a month.

Since its last statement in March, deposits have increased even in excess of that rate, or a gain of almost five and a half millions, according to W. R. Gard, Eugene manager. Early in June the United States National increased its capital structure by the issuance of new stock to the amount of \$750,000, making the present total in capital, surplus, undivided profits and reserves of approximately nine million dollars.

"Another gratifying feature," stated Gard, "is the increase in loans and discounts, showing that there is a constantly increasing demand for money with which to conduct commercial and farm enterprises."
