**CONFERENCES SEEN AS DIPLOMATIC AID**  
 PORTLAND, July 7.—(AP)—The defense against international disputes will turn more and more to the collective system of conferences in future years, Lt. Comdr. Stewart Bryant, United States navy retired, told the Pacific Northwest Institute of International Relations in session at Reed college.  
 "The drift of the whole last four centuries has been leading up to it; it is inevitable," he said in predicting the success of conferences of nations to settle their troubles.  
 "The defense against chaos may be partly military, partly in developing an economic system which can take the shock," he said. "Our security lies in rapidly increasing proportion in the latter."  
 He said that in his opinion there "never has been a league of nations—you don't have a dam if there are great gaps in it."

**COAST ADVERTISING MEN MEET; FORSEE INCREASED LINEAGE**  
 SEATTLE, July 7.—(AP)—A tremendous increase in national newspaper advertising during the next six months was foreseen here today at the annual convention of the Pacific Advertising Club's association.  
 Leslie M. Barton, New York City, declared business men would put more money into newspaper advertising "rather than give it to the government under the new tax bill."  
 "Advertising particularly within the building industries, will exceed anything we have ever known," Barton said in his address before more than 1,000 delegates to the convention.  
**Praises Newspapers**  
 He praised newspaper advertising as "more effective than any other medium."  
 Using cigarettes and automobiles as illustrations, Barton said newspaper advertising brought returns in proportion to expenditures.  
 "One brand did 22.8 per cent of the newspaper advertising in the New York area. Its sales were 22.5 of the total sales. Another brand did 29.5 per cent of the newspaper advertising and its sales were 31.5 per cent. A third brand did 29.6 per cent advertising and sold 39.9 per cent. A fourth brand did 5.1 per cent and its sales were 5.1," he said.  
**Cites Motor Cases**  
 "One automobile corporation did 43 per cent of the advertising and made 35.9 per cent of the sales. Another did 40.9 per cent and made 29 per cent of the sales. A third did 16.1 per cent of the newspaper advertising and made 22.1 per cent of all the sales.
