REMNANT OF A VANISHED RACE



IN the jungle of Indo-China, near the city of Angkor, rise the ruins of a magnificent temple which has been as much a mystery to scientists as have the people who built it and worshipped in it. It is the Angkor-Wat, built, it is believed, about the beginning of the twelfth century, and standing today in resplendent splendor, its long, frescoed galleries and halls echoing only the footsteps of amazed tourists.

Archaeologists say this is one of the many temples that a strange tribe called Khmers built in Cambodia, as this part of the Orient is termed, after they had invaded the country from India about 2000 years ago. The Angkor-Wat is considered the finest and grandest piece of Khmer workmanship. You may see a picture of this temple on a stamp of two values, issued by Indo-China in 1922.
