Week-end Loop Trip Taking In Clear, Suttle Lakes and Metolius, McKenzie Rivers Recommended for Motorists

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is one of a series of weekly dispatches, presented by United Press and the U. S. forest service, describing the opportunities for week-end or longer trips into the United States national forests of the Pacific Northwest.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—(UP)—This week the forest service recommends for city-dwelling motorists one that in a one-house legislature, each member would have to handle an abnormal amount of bills, thus increasing "log-rolling."

Turning to the situation in Oregon, Mr. Rodman asserted that much of the present outcry against legislative action arises from improper use of the initiative and referendum, which divides authority between a qualified and non-qualified group—the legislature and the body of people. He also hit at a remedy, proposals to have a very small number of legislators, and to increase wages so as to make legislative duty entirely compensatory.

of the outstanding mountain recreation areas in the northwest, the upper McKenzie river district in the Willamette national forest.

From Springfield, 127 miles south of Portland, the McKenzie river highway leads east to McKenzie Bridge, 55 miles. From Yale's ranch, a short distance above McKenzie bridge a gravelled road turns north from the main highway following the river for 18 miles to its head in Clear lake.

This is suggested by the forest service as a main objective of the trip.

From Clear lake the return trip should include Fish lake, three miles distant on the upper Santiam watershed, and a swing back over Hogg pass into the Deschutes national forest at Suttle lake and the Metolius, 15 to 25 miles, according to the forest service. The highway distance from Suttle lake to Sisters is 15 miles and from Sisters back over the McKenzie Pass to Eugene 96 miles.

peaks, is made more accessible to motorists this year by improved roads and highways, the forest service stated.

Mountain resorts furnishing beds and meals are available at McKenzie Bridge, Belknap Springs, Clear lake, Suttle lake, and the Metolius, while free forest motorist camps are provided along the upper McKenzie, the upper Metolius, and the dozens of lakes and meadows that intervene.

Snow mountains include the Three Sisters, with elevations varying from 10,033 to 10,354 feet; Broken Top, 9,165 feet; Mt. Washington, 7,802 feet; Three-Fingered Jack, 7,848 feet; and Mt. Jefferson, 10,495 feet.

Of Volcanic Origin
Clear lake owed its origin to a volcanic eruption which dammed the valley at the McKenzie source. Forests on the floor of the valley were submerged in places to a depth of 190 feet deep, and well preserved trunks of trees in shallower places are still visible far under the surface of the water. Fortunately for the beauty of the setting the heavy forest along much of the shore was not destroyed by the lava.

Fine catches of rainbows are taken by trollers in this cold lake. Boats are available and visitors are urged to enjoy the three-mile hike around the lake, visiting giant springs, (temperature 41 degrees), which break from the ground almost a full-fledged river. Three picturesque falls attract sightseers below the lake where the McKenzie rushes down its forested canyon.

Deer abound in this district, according to the forest service. The fisherman, the wild flower and wild life enthusiast, the geologist, the mountaineer, or the unclassified recreation seeker who simply likes the mountains and the out-of-doors will find themselves repaid for time spent in this area of airy trails, rivers and lakes.
