Beans and Beets Coming to E. F. G. Cannery This Week

The first beets and beans of the season are arriving at the plant of the Eugene Fruit Growers association. The run is not as yet general, but each day from now on will see additional deliveries as a greater number of plantings reach the harvesting stage. Cannery officials expect canning operations in these crops will be in full swing by the end of next week.

Beans are the largest crop handled by the cannery each year, and beets

also are one of the main vegetable crops there.

The cannery is also receiving second cutting rhubarb. Receivers at the plant state that growers of this crop should plan to make deliveries by the middle of next week.

Red sour, or Montmorency cherries are ripening and growers with more advanced orchards will start picking Monday. Some trouble is being experienced this season with the cherry fruit fly and cannery officials recommend that growers get in touch with them if deliveries are to be made to the association plants.
