COUPLE OBSERVE 65TH ANNIVERSARY

SPRINGFIELD, July 11—(Special)—Representing nearly three-quarters of a century, the sixty-fifth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey Meacham, 832 D street, will be celebrated Sunday with an informal dinner at the home of the couple.
It was July 12, 1871, that Mr. and Mrs. Meacham were married at Brandon, N. Y. in a year that is nearly three generations ago. The wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Meacham, at 65 years, is a remarkable record, rarely, if ever equalled.
Mr. Meacham is 80, being born in Dickinson, N. Y., Dec. 27, 1847. Mrs. Elizabeth Meacham is 81, having been born in Brandon, N. Y., May 11, 1855.
Mr. Meacham is a Civil War veteran, a member of Co. F, 142nd regiment, New York, and is the sole survivor of the regiment. After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Meacham lived on a farm in Dickinson, until 1901, when they went to Oklahoma City, coming to Drain, Oregon, in 1905. In 1910 they came to Springfield, where they now reside.
Despite his age, Mr. Meacham is active, doing a great deal of painting work in his garden, while Mrs. Meacham does all the housework.
